MCGILL II BEAT QUEEN'S II BY 13 GOALS TO 7

In the First of the Intercollegiate Hockey Semi-Finals—Other Hockey News—Doings at the Curling Rink.

Any hopes which the supporters of Queen's II hockey team had for their winning the intermediate intercollegiate championship were snuffed out Monday evening when, at the covered rink, McGill II defeated the Queen's II by 13 to 7, after a hard fought battle, of which McGill had the better at all times. The ice was in excellent condition but there was an exceptionally poor house owing to the fact that the management had no time in which to advertise the game. The weather, too, was very bad, and no doubt had a great deal to do with the crowd.

Anglin started the scoring work for Queen's doing the first trick one minute and twenty seconds after the puck was faced off. He made it on a nice bit of play down the side and then over to centre. After the puck had been faced off the second time Elliott, in his attempt to gain control of the puck, was given a rest on the penalty bench. Anglin scored the second time in one minute and a half from the time the first one was put in.

Then McGill commenced to figure on the scoring line and Murray, the centre man, scored on a nice rush from centre. Thompson, of McGill, netted another goal five minutes later on a pass.

Elliott scored the next one for Queen's on an individual rush from centre. Smith tallied for McGill a few minutes later on a short shot from the right side, while Lewis evaded up the score on a shot which found a vacancy behind Warwick in the nets. Smith, McGill's wing man, was put off for tripping but when he got back on the ice again he scored twice in succession. This finished the first half, McGill leading by 6 to 4.

The second half was a great deal better brand of hockey than the first and was quite exciting. Queen's showed better form and played their positions better. Blakeley got the puck and started down the ice. When near McGill goal he lost it in trying to shoot and it passed behind the nets. He got it again and on a short shot scored. Forgie, who replaced Lewis, who was hurt in the first half, was called off. In a little while later McGill's goal a few minutes later Warwick, the custodian of the nets, could not resist the temptation to get in a little illegal work and was sent to the bench. Smith, the speedy wing man of McGill, scored ten minutes after full time on a brilliant rush down the side. Forgie, the new man, distinguished himself in the next score. He and M. Meikle had been working the combination down the centre. Meikle shot and it went down beside the nets. Forgie poked it out to Meikle, who scored. Thompson, of McGill, followed with a nice rush down centre and shot with telling effect. Elliott was benched during the next few minutes Riley and Thompson scored for McGill on some fine combination work. Queen's sprinted but their opponents were right on the job and Hughes tallied one by himself.

In a mix-up a few moments later, A. V. Meikle was carried off the ice from being hurt. McGill put off a man to look after him and Smith scored for the Montreal boys in an easy manner. Forgie had his eye hurt as the result of being run into, and was off for a while. Hughes, of McGill, and Elliott, of Queen's, were each given a rest on the penalty bench. M. Meikle made a rush from centre down right side over to centre and scored. This finished the scoring.

McGill played better hockey all around and the victory which they won was well earned. For the busy tri-colo boys made them earn every thing they got. The combination work of the McGill team was marvellous. Their lightning dashes down the ice and brilliant boring was the wonder of the rosters. Queen's did quite a lot of loafing, waiting until an opponent was upon them, before they made any attempt to get away. The back checking of Blakeley was particularly noticeable and many times he saved the situation for his team. When a McGill man got past him with the puck he got after him and times without number stopped some dangerous shots. Each man on Queen's team distinguished himself more or less, although individual praise if any should go to M. Meikle, in the centre for his work the entire evening was a marvel.

McGill's whole line-up did splendid work, the forward line being most effective. Smith, Riley, Thompson and Murray working perfectly together. Warwick, in goal, did splendid work, and he is responsible to a great degree for the score not being higher. Smith was the pick of the team.

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HOME FOR THE AGED UNIVERSITY PASTOR

ANNUAL MEETING HELD ON MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Everything About the Home in Fine Order—The Finances Better Than Ever Before—A Heated Talk at the Close of the Meeting.

The board of directors of the Home for the Aged met in the police court room, Monday afternoon, for their annual meeting. Mayor Graham presided. The report of the directors for the year was first read. It expressed gratification upon the success which has attended the work of the home. The institution is fairly well equipped and affords a degree of comfort to the inmates which they heartily appreciate. The cost of maintenance per day was 25.84 cents, which was higher than last year and much higher than former years, owing to the betterment of the class of food. The city had a total representation of forty-three among the inmates during the year, and the counties of Frontenac and Lennox and Addington sixteen each. The total cost for the year was \$1,857.77 as compared with \$1,222.51 in 1909.

The poor in the home are looked after by Dr. A. R. B. Williamson, who visits them regularly, at least once a week, and at other times when asked to do so by the superintendent. The county poor from the united counties are looked after by Dr. A. W. McCarthy and he leaves with the superintendent a brief report of each visit. The home, being without nurses, those who become ill are at once removed to the general hospital.

The value of the domestic committee, as pointed out in the report, is inestimable. Its members visit the home from time to time, inspect every department of it, examine the beds and clothing, consult with regard to the cooking appliances and confer with Mr. and Mrs. Greer upon every detail of management. This committee also informs the board from time to time of the wants of the home, and it purchases when orders are issued, such articles of clothing for the women and of household equipment as may be necessary. They not only advise, but they serve. During the year there was considerable work in the way of repairs, such as painting and carpeting, which will not have to be done this year. The garden turned out well last year the produce bringing in \$187.90 as compared with \$76.59, the previous year. The close of the report commended the caretaker and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Greer, for the excellent work which they had done, and for their painstaking efforts on behalf of those who were inmates.

The report of the income and expenditures of the institution for the year revealed the fact that the income was \$4,413.34, and the total expenditures, \$3,291.69, leaving a balance in the bank of \$1,241.25.

The superintendent's report showed that the total number of admissions for the year was 76, of which forty-nine were male and twenty-six were female. Sixty-six of the inmates were Protestants and nine were Roman Catholics.

This completed the reading of the reports, and the matter of electing a new board for the ensuing year was then taken up, with the result that Mrs. A. A. Jordan, Mrs. Montagu Strange, Mrs. Samuel Birch, Miss Macfar, Robert Meek, Hugh C. Nickle, W. J. Crothers and Dr. A. P. Chown will constitute the new board.

The question was asked why the Skinner wing was being occupied by only one couple, while there were six empty rooms not occupied by anyone, which could profitably be occupied by the inmates. Miss Skinner, who was present, said the wing had been built for the express purpose of providing a suite of rooms, which could be occupied by married couples without any interference. Since the wing had been built, there had never been more than two or three couples occupying it at any one time. She was sorry that this was the case, but it was so. It was resolved, on motion of Miss Macfar, seconded by Canon Starr, that the question of providing better accommodation for respectable aged women should be brought to the attention of the new board. Considerable discussion was provoked on this question, and it finally became so warm that Ald. Ross moved that the meeting be adjourned and this was seconded by Ald. Cooper, and carried.
