HE IS AN EXPERT.

Col. Smith Can Overthrow the Most Eloquent.

Toronto Saturday Night. There are snobs and sneezes. Parliament has a number of experts, but "daddy of them all" is Col. Henry Smith, the genial sergeant-at-arms, who spends his time lifting the mace off and on the table during routine proceedings. When Col. Smith is about to sneeze, there are certain premonitory symptoms. He sends a page boy hurriedly for a glass of water, he carefully sneezes his sword, and after glancing apologetically at Mr. Speaker, makes a noise like a ton of coal going down a chute. During one of the most eloquent passages of Mr. Fielding's speech on the reciprocity arrangement, anxious observers noticed that Col. Smith was making active preparations for indulging in his favorite pastime. Everyone waited for a shock: "Tommy" Owens, of the Hansard staff, gripped his pencil hard, and braced himself in his chair at the small table. Just as Mr. Fielding was swelling along on a tidal wave of appreciation of President Taft, who had made the negotiations "a labor of love," the well-chosen period was interrupted by a roar from the sergeant-at-arms. It completely drowned the rest of the sentence, and the echoes of the mighty noise resounded from the glass roof of the chamber. Lady Laurier, who was peacefully asleep in the speaker's gallery, awoke with a start, and the wife of a senator was so surprised that she let her muff fall on the head of Mr. Dubeau, of Joliette, who was seated immediately below. Mr. Fielding looked severely at the house official, and Sydney Fisher's thin, small voice piped "Order." And now everyone is wondering what Col. Smith has against President Taft, anyway.

THE STOCK MARKET. The Prices Paid at the Various Centres. Montreal, Feb. 6.—About 750 head of butchers' cattle, 150 calves, 200 sheep and lambs, and 1,050 hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. The offerings of live stock at this market during the week were 1,680 cattle, 275 calves, 980 sheep and lambs, and 3,625 hogs.

Trade was fair, while the prices had an upward tendency, especially for mutton cutters. Prime beefs sold at 64c. to 67c. per lb., pretty good animals, 5c. to 6c., and the common stock, 3c. to 4c. per lb. Calves sold at 41c. to 7c. per lb.

Sheep sold at 41c. to 47c. per lb.; lambs at about 61c. Good lot of hogs sold at about 5c. per lb.

Buffalo Live Stock. East Buffalo, Feb. 6.—Cattle receipts, 3,375; market active and steady; prime steers, \$6.25 to \$6.55; butcher grades, \$5 to \$6.75; cows, \$3.50 to \$5.25. Calves, receipts, 500; market, active, 25c. lower; cull to choice, \$6 to \$10.50. Sheep and lambs, receipts, 23,000; market active and steady; choice lambs, \$6 to \$6.10; cull to fair, \$4.75 to \$5.75; yearlings, \$5 to \$5.25; sheep, \$3 to \$4.50. Hogs, receipts, 11,050; market, active, stronger; Yorkers, \$8.20 to \$8.30; stags, \$6 to \$6.50; pigs, \$8.50 to \$8.65; mixed, \$8.10 to \$8.15; heavy, \$7.90 to \$8; roughs, \$7 to \$7.10.

Sheep receipts, 18,000; market strong native, \$2.50 to \$4.30; Western, \$2.25 to \$4.30; lambs, \$4.25 to \$6.10; Western, \$4.40 to \$6.10.

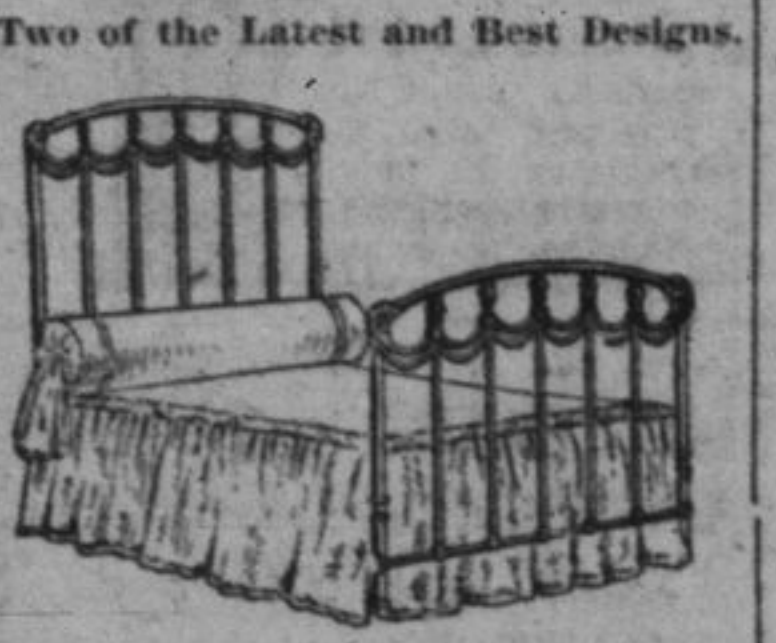
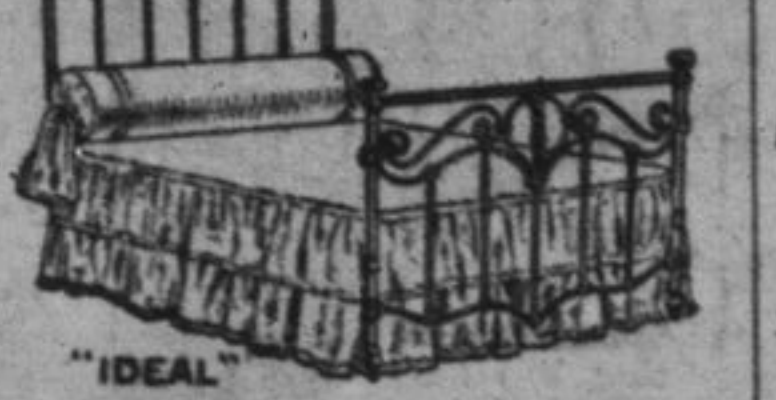
