HERE TO TAKE SOUNDINGS.

Public Works Engineers Will Report on the Harbor.

A. W. Gregory and H. W. Davy, engineers of the public works department, Ottawa, are here to take soundings of the harbor from the Carruthers' shoal down into the lower harbor, in connection with the proposed improvements to navigation. They reported, this morning, to Postmaster Stewart and Ald. R. F. Elliott for information, and engaged a number of men to aid them in their work. This is the quick response of the minister of marine to the request of the Kingston deputation which went to Ottawa last week to interview him with reference to harbor matters.
