The provincial government is to provide for inspection of laundries. The Bischoff Cocoa and Chocolate company, Brooklyn, was burned out.

The provincial government is agreeable to change the date of the annual municipal elections.

Ald. Lovejoy, Hamilton, was unseated by Judge Monck because some of his taxes are in arrears.

Further developments are expected, to-day, in connection with the wreck of the Farmers' Bank of Canada.

Lord Strathcona has given £1,000 as a guarantee of the initial expenses of the imperial exhibition in 1915.

The Hamilton Board of Trade refused to join with the fruit growers in the protest against the trade agreement.

Five men working on the car ferries between Windsor and Detroit have been arrested on a charge of robbing cars in transit.

A cyclone at Salem, Tenn., wrecked farm houses, injured many persons and killed a two-year-old child of Ella Huerst.

"Kil," who for more than twenty years has conducted "Woman's Kingdom" in the Toronto Mail and Empire, has resigned.

Henry Steven, Utica, N.Y., breeder of thoroughbred Holstein-Friesian cattle, is dead, aged seventy-one. He had been blind many years.

An English syndicate with vast capital is said to be seeking to purchase the Dominion Power and Transmission company, of Hamilton.

Japan has sent a handsome silver vase to W. T. R. Preston, in recognition of his efforts to establish friendly commercial relations between Japan and Canada.

The king has commanded that a number of objects from his wonderful Indian collection shall be exhibited at the forthcoming festival of the empire at the Crystal Palace.

"Son" Mathews, in jail awaiting trial on the charge of strangling a woman in a Colborne hotel, was allowed liberty for a short time, to visit his mother, who is dying.

The London police made another raid in the Sidney street district. Stegny, and arrested a man and a woman. The latter is possibly the accomplice in the Houndsditch murders.

A new occasional lectureship is to be established at the University of Toronto, thanks to a bequest of \$5,000 received from Mrs. Lydia Marslett. The foundation is in memory of her late husband.

Conductor William Mencham and Engineer Robert Earitt were found responsible for the collision, near Paris, that resulted in six persons being killed. Earitt, carried into court, admitted his responsibility.
