GERMAN SCARE IN BERMUDA.

Sailors of Cruiser Hansa Detected Photographing Fortifications.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Feb. 9.—The German scare has extended to Bermuda. It synchronized, this week, with the arrival from the West Indies of the German cruiser Hansa, commanded by Captain Feld.

There was much firing of cannon, and official visits were paid and returned. A sudden termination to the festivities and consequent good fellowship was brought about by the fact that certain of the crew of the Hansa were detected in endeavors to obtain photographic views of the fortifications and approaches of the navy yard, and the situation of the lights and bearings.

When these facts came to the knowledge of the colonial authorities the lighthouse and navy yard were immediately closed to all visitors, except such as received special permission.

The Hansa only remained a few days.

OUT OF IMPERIAL ORBIT.

What Reciprocity Agreement Does For Canada.

London, Feb. 8.—The reciprocity agreement between Canada and the United States was brought up in the Commons, this afternoon, by Austen Chamberlain, who remarked that it was a very delicate question, involving the tariff policy of one of the great dominions. He asserted that the agreement removed Canada from the imperial orbit and drew her into the vortex of continental politics and interests of the United States. One result would be, he said, that food in England would cost more, and he demanded to know if the British government was taking steps to secure a similar reciprocity with Canada.

"Oatmeal King" Dead.

Mitchell, Feb. 8.—Walter Thomson, a prominent and wealthy citizen, of Mitchell, and until recently one of the largest millers and grain dealers in western Ontario, died at the residence of his son, in Texas, on Friday. He was formerly known as the Oatmeal King, and had milling interests in London, Woodstock, Searforth and Mitchell. He was born in Kelso, Scotland, in 1835, but has lived since 1870 in Ontario, and since 1897 had been a resident of Mitchell.

FEDORENKO CASE REVIVED.

Russian Government to Appeal to Privy Council.

Winnipeg, Feb. 9.—The famous Fedorenko extradition case, which terminated abruptly several weeks ago, when Justice Robson ordered the discharge of the prisoner on a legal technicality respecting the formal requisition usual in extradition cases, is by no means over.

It will be taken by the Russian government to the foot of the British throne, by way of a direct appeal from the judgment of Judge Robson. There is precedent for this appeal to the Privy Council of Great Britain, in the famous Gaynor and Greene case, and the procedure in the Fedorenko case will be similar.

TAKEN FOR A FLY.

He Cried Because it Ended Too Soon in Daddy's Aeroplane.

Garden City, L.I., Feb. 9.—The youngest aviator in the country is the distinction claimed, to-day, by Robert Lawson, three and a half years old, who accompanied by his father and pilot, William Hilliard, flew for several minutes, yesterday afternoon, in a Burgess biplane. Hilliard cut the flight short for fear of injury to his youthful charge which brought lusty cries of protest was little Bobby.

A Veteran Methodist.

Calgary, Wash., Feb. 8.—With the proud record of having preached eight thousand sermons and having had charge of nineteen separate churches in various parts of Ontario, Rev. Dr. Langford, formerly of Hamilton, celebrated the fifty-fourth anniversary of his becoming probationer, in his twentieth church, Central Methodist, here on Sunday. He is seventy-five years of age, and was ordained fifty years ago, and before preparing for the ministry was in the Fifth Hussars. On Sunday he preached an interesting sermon of reminiscences. He is hale and well, and says he is capable of filling many more pulpits. At present he is taking temporary six months' charge at Central Methodist church in place of the Rev. G. W. Kerby.

Wilmington, Del., Feb. 8.—While a British ship was loading dynamite and other explosives for Mexico, a small stick was dropped on the wharf. After a long search one of the crew, an Englishman, admitted that he had picked up the stick of what he called "a blooming sweet" and had eaten it for candy. Its taste, he said, was not disagreeable. He showed no ill after effects.

SPRING HATS QUEER.

Sugarloaf, Sailor and Gondola Shapes.

London, Feb. 8.—The new spring hats, which have appeared in the Paris shops are eccentric to a degree.

The sugar loaf which promises to have a vogue is an exact copy of a Perrot cap with pointed top and tiny turned up brim of fine straw. The only trimming is a feather of the curled variety. Little sailor hats with round turned up brims are also to be worn by smart women. One example seen recently was in jet velvet, the brim being lined with black velvet, while on the crown was perched a feather butterfly, of the red tint, which appears in millinery just now.

A close relation to the sailor hat is a model on which there is the same turned up brim with a crown that looks like an inverted basin.

Gondola shaped toques figure largely in the new hat displays, being pointed back and front so that they really look like little gondolas. Many of them are made of flowers, while on almost all the new radish red which is the present rage appears in some form. Even ostrich feathers are variegated in this new shade and white.

A VETERAN ORANGEMAN.

Presentation at Toledo to Robert Seymour.

Toledo, Feb. 5.—The home of Robert Seymour was the scene of a very pleasant event on Feb. 1st when a delegation from Toledo L.O.O.F., No. 289, assembled to do honor to Mr. Seymour, one of Leeds county's oldest and noblest Orangemen. Rev. W. E. Kidd, pastor of St. Thomas' church, Frankville, read an address. James Wright, Newbliss, presented him with a cane.

Mr. Seymour was born in county Armagh, Ireland, in 1832, and joined the Orange order in 1848, marching in Ireland on July 12th, 1848 and 1849. In the summer of 1850 he decided to leave the land of his birth for America and was on shipboard on the Atlantic during the twelfth of 1850, the day being remembered by the captain assembling all Orangemen and Protestants on deck for scripture reading and prayers. In the year 1851 the subject of this sketch walked in Smith's Falls with Lombardy lodge to which he has since belonged, never missing a celebration that he did not march with his brethren.

Thaw Must Stay.

Albany, N.Y., Feb. 8.—Harry K. Thaw must remain at Matteawan prison. The court of appeals has dismissed his appeal from the decision of the appellate division adverse to his contention that he was being detained illegally in the state hospital for the insane.
