Ottawa's Cheap Power. Ottawa Journal.

Ottawa's publicity literature states that Ottawa has the cheapest power in Canada, which is an undisputable fact. Indeed the Ottawn rate of \$15 a horse power per year is almost the cheapest general power rate known anywhere. It is true that a certain limited American power on the St. Lawrence is being) sold at \$12.56 per horse power, but this is only a temporary price intended to introduce the power, and will probably soon be increased. Seeing certain American cities widely advertize the fact that power can be obtained there at \$27.50 a horse power, Ottawa should be well satisfied at the conditions it is able to offer manufacturers in this respect.
