AT BRYCE'S REQUEST

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO BE CONSULTED.

The Question Now Becomes a Big International One—The News Developed at Meeting of Committee on Commerce.

Washington, Feb. 11.—To the astonishment of the supporters of the bill which would permit the Aluminum company of America to dam the St. Lawrence river at the Long Sault rapids, the whole proceedings before the senate committee on commerce have been halted at the express request of the state department.

This was disclosed at a meeting of the committee on commerce, when an effort was made to have the subcommittee report to the full committee on that action could be taken and the bill expedited with a favorable report on the senate floor.

London, Feb. 11.—The ancient royal glass coach, used for two centuries in the coronation ceremonies, was destroyed by fire, yesterday, together with the queen's barouche, another vehicle used on state occasions, when fire swept the plant of a carriage builder in the west end where both were being renovated.

A BIG OFFER

Made for Church Property in Montreal's Heart.

Montreal, Feb. 11.—An offer of a million and a quarter dollars was received for Christ Church cathedral, Montreal's largest Anglican church, from a syndicate of business men, the rumor which has been current for several days, was confirmed when Bishop Farthing brought the matter up in the synod.

FOR SHORTER HOURS.

Australian Federation Declare for 44 Hour Week.

Sydney, N.S.W., Feb. 11.—The labor conference, the organization which controls the leagues throughout the whole federation, has declared for a forty-four hour week, and a six-hour day for women, employed in factories together with a minimum wage of eight shillings a day.

ALGOMA CENTRAL RAILWAY.

J. D. McArthur Secures Contract for Unfinished Portion.

Winnipeg, Feb. 11.—Word has been received here to the effect that J. D. McArthur, railway contractor, of this city, has been awarded the contract for building the unfinished portion of the Algoma Central railway in Northern Ontario from the present end of steel to a junction with the main line of the C.P.R., near White River.

Chatanooga, Tenn., Feb. 11.—Reports from the bedside of George Denen, the Brooklyn prize fighter, are that he is shaking and cannot live. He was knocked out here, Thursday night, by Jake Abel. Much sentiment was developed against the present fight-law.

END OF RADUM FAMINE.

Professor Hahn Has Obtained Effective Substitute.

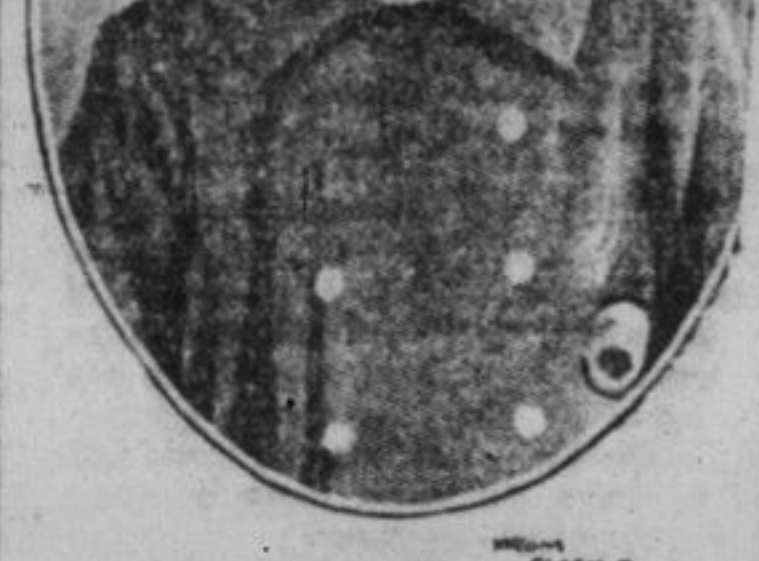
THE MILNE INCIDENT
