THE BIBLE SOCIETY

THE ANNUAL MEETING HELD IN CHALMERS' CHURCH.

Strong Appeal Will be Made for the Support of the Society—Address Delivered by Rev. W. B. Cooper, M.A.—The Officers Elected.

The annual meeting of the local branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held last night in Chalmers' church and the attendance was very slim, there being only about sixty people in attendance. It is indeed a tact much to be regretted that the attendance was so small at such an important meeting. Reports of the work were received and Rev. W. B. Cooper, M.A., the agent of the society, gave an address dealing with the work of the society, making a strong appeal for support in the work. The reports did not show a most successful year, as regards the collection of money for the carrying on of the work, but for the new year it is hoped to put new vigor into the work and that much good will result.

Rev. Dr. MacFavish was in the chair and the choir of Chalmers' church assisted in the musical part of the programme. Bishop Mills offered prayer.

Dr. MacFavish regretted the small attendance but pointed out how many great movements had been started by just a few people. He referred to the fact that this year marked the 307th anniversary of the translation of the Bible, and this was one great reason for an extra effort to be put forward to spread the word. He spoke of the thousands coming out to Canada to live and of the many opportunities for the work of the society.

The secretary, Rev. H. D. Whitmore, submitted a report, giving the amounts raised by the different churches for the society's work. The work was moving along slowly, he reported, but there was room for improvement. Mr. Whitmore also submitted the report of the treasurer, Dr. E. J. Lake, which showed a total of \$22,55 raised for the work during the year.

It was held that the society was hardly holding its own but renewed effort is being looked forward to and an extra effort is to be put forth to reach the people for support. The following officers were elected, on motion of Rev. Mr. Savary:

Hon. president, Bishop Mills; pre-

sident, Rev. T. W. Neal; first vice-president, Rev. D. Laing; second vice-president, Rev. Dr. MacGillivray; secretary, Rev. H. D. Whitmore; treasurer, Mr. E. J. Lake; auditors, George Haig and Joseph E. Clarke.

The executive will be composed of the officers, pastors of the city churches and Messrs. H. A. Calvin, Francis King, F. G. Lockett, George Mills, G. Macdonnell, B. W. Robertson, Oliver Shaw, Dr. Third, William Graves, J. Laturnay, Edward Bennett, John F. McEvon, R. Waldran, sr., Dr. R. E. Sparks.

On motion of Rev. D. Laing and Rev. S. Sellery, it was decided to appeal to the auxiliary, to put forth every effort possible to advance the work this year. The master and seconder regretted the lack of interest, but were confident of better results, if the effort was put forth.

Rev. Dr. MacGillivray and Rev. J. D. Boyd moved a resolution, which was also carried, that a special effort be made to secure more money for the work, the recommendation being made that the city be canvassed by wards, for subscriptions, or that other means be taken, which would be deemed advisable, for the collection.

The executive will deal with this matter.

Rev. Mr. Boyd pointed out the necessity for the emphasis to be placed on the Bible. The Bible was not given the place it should receive in many homes. In many cases the Bible was laid away, and allowed to be covered over with dust.

The address of Rev. Mr. Cooper dealt with the work of the society, and was a most interesting and helpful one. He dwelt upon the great need for means to spread the gospel. He referred to the missionary effort, and said that it should go hand in hand with the work of the society, dealing with the translation of the Bible into many languages. He regretted the fact that the local branch had not been able to do more for the good of the cause, but he felt sure that when the next annual meeting was held, that better reports would be given.

At the close, on motion of Rev. Mr. Laing, a vote of thanks was extended to the speaker of the evening.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead, and cultivate his land as his own, and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good health may file a pre-emption claim in his name, and occupy his land alongside his homestead. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead for a term of six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra, and pay taxes on each of the extra 50 acres. Duties—Any person who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased pre-emption in plain language, for \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
