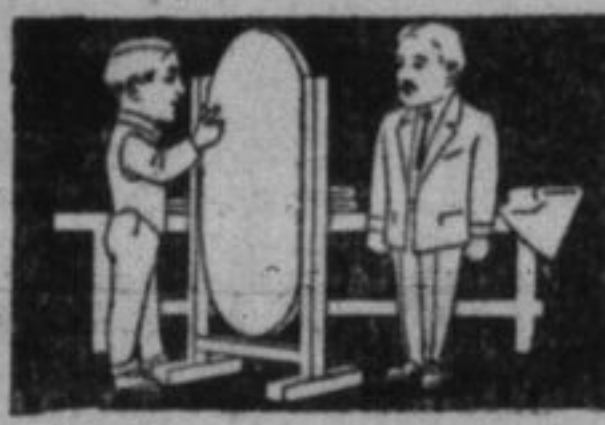

THE SPORT REVIEW

FRONTENACS DEFEATED PETERBORO BY 7 TO 1.

The Locals Win the Round by 18 to 5.—The Frontenacs were changed about by the absence of "Bouncer" Brouse.

Before a crowd of 1,200 persons at the covered rink, last night, the Junior Frontenacs defeated the Peterboro Grinders in their final game, by a score of 7 to 1, thus winning the round by a lead of thirteen points. To say that the Frontenac team walked over the boys from the cheap power town would not be telling the truth, for the lads of the Limestone City worked and fought hard for every goal obtained. The score would indicate that the local boys had the better of the game all through. This they had, but a great many times the fans were on their feet for fear that McCammon or Williams would fail to check the whirlwind rushes. To successfully check, they very seldom failed to do, and if by ill-luck they failed the gallant Marchand was right on the job and proved too much for the Griller forwards.

The struggle was in many respects a repetition of the game in Peterboro, Tuesday night. In the first fifteen minutes of play the honors were about even, neither team seeming to be able to score. At last Davidson, the big defence man, obtained control of the rubber and a cheer went up, for the fans knew when "Seety" had it they were sure that something would be doing. Davidson made a magnificent rush up the centre of the ice, over to the left side and shot it in. By means of their combination work, the Frontenacs wormed the puck down to their opponents' goal, but the shot missed, and went behind the nets. Boyer poked it out and Millan found a place for it over the bar. McCammon, in one of his spectacular rushes got down the ice past centre, and when near the goal, passed to Millan, who tallied. This finished the scoring in the first half, Peterboro having a blank sheet. Near the end of the first half, Hall, the centre of Peterboro's team, who had set a terrific pace, from the start, was forced to go off the ice for a few minutes, as he was about all in. Boyer went off to even up the teams.

Five minutes after half time, Boyer touched Peterboro for the first goal on a pretty shot from the right side, and it was only a few minutes later that Hunt, by a marvellous piece of play, scored again. Anderson, the fast wing man of the visitors, scored the only goal which they obtained, on a shot close in front of the Frontenacs' goal. Millan and Hunt worked their well-known combination with such telling effect that another goal was added to their list. A few minutes later, Millan, who was making splendid time toward the enemies' nets received a heavy fall as the result of being tripped by Reynolds. The last goal which the Frontenacs obtained was made by Davidson, who made a nice shot from near centre. A few minutes later time was called.

Be it known to all that the Peterboro Grinders are the cleanest and fairest bunch of sports that the Frontenacs have ever been up against. Also that they are no slouches. Every man on the team worked for all he was worth. Those who were there were confident that it was no walk over for the local boys the way the other games were, and a great deal more interest is taken in a game where the winning team has to work for all they get. The Grinders certainly are a fast and able body of players and are the huskiest bunch of players that the champions have been up against yet. Nearly every man is bigger than the Frontenac men. Their players are all good, but perhaps the most effective man on the team is Reynolds, the man who holds down the position of point. He certainly has more speed and tricks than most players who visit this city in the course of the season. Their goalkeeper, Patterson was a wonder. He seemed to know just where the shots would hit, and was right there to stop them. The shots were rained upon him times without number, and only for his marvellous work the score would have been larger.

Marchand for the locals played the game of his life and stopped the rubber in all shapes. Twice or three times he dropped his stick between his knees and caught the puck in his hands. He stopped some very hard shots in an easy manner. Williams was tried out at point, and made a good showing. McCammon played the best game so far this season, and performed his duties with the coolness of a veteran. His rushing and checking were spectacular. The whole team work with the regularity of clockwork. Boyer on wing took more punishment than any other man of the team. Millan, the

fast forward, struck to his man like a burr, and worked brilliantly. Davidson in his new position at rover seemed to be perfectly at home, and played the game just as well there as in his old position in the defence region. Hunt, at centre, played his usual heady game and kept his opponents guessing all the time. Hall for the visitors was in good trim and played well all the way through. Heferman at cover was good, and is a brilliant player.

Edward Wittlauffer, the referee, said it was about the best he ever heard of with possibly the exception of Eaton's in Toronto. When their Rooters' club go to Mutual street rink, in Toronto, nothing can be heard of Convocation Hall—Owing to the illness of Dr. Carmichael, Prof. Dall will take the service at Queen's college on Sunday.

REV. T. E. BOURKE SPEAKS

At the Irish Temperance League Meeting in Belfast.

The Northern Whig, of Belfast, Ireland, contains the following report of Rev. T. E. Bourke's address at the Irish Temperance League annual meeting in that city:

Rev. T. E. Bourke, B.D., Kingston, Ont., who was received with applause, said he was delighted to stand on that platform and address such a large body of his audience. He had been introduced as one coming from the land of the maple leaf, but he could tell them that long before he had seen Canada he had been privileged to see the green fields of Ireland, for he was born in the county Mayo. (Applause.) In considering his subject that evening he was told to speak upon the advantages of total abstinence. He had never spoken on that aspect of the question, because they were a long way past that in Canada; they had only one object before them now, and that was the wiping out of the liquor traffic for ever. (Applause.) All the churches in that country, including the Roman Catholic church, has pronounced against it, and some of them made total abstinence a condition of membership. (Applause.) Through the power of local veto they had three-fourths of the great dominion "dry," and if the British empire was to march in the van of civilization his word to England was "sober up." (Applause.) It was said that the Englishman was not wanted in Canada. If he came to their shores to make his home and work, as thousands were doing, he was welcome, but if he came, as some, alas, did come, to waste time in hangout about the drinkshops, they had no use for him. What they called the great burning questions were to him little insignificant things. (Applause.) The greatest issue for the British empire was the closing of the public houses. All over Canada, in public and private enterprise, they did not look at letters of introduction, but at the faces of the applicants for employment, and the one thing indispensable in every case was total abstinence. (Applause.)

He Passed Away at Limerick, New York State.
