The Cause of Tuberculosis.

For many years tuberculosis or consumption was believed to be inherited, It was often observed that one child after another of the family died the disease, and it was thought to be transmitted directly from parent to child. In 1882, Robert Koch, a German physician, discovered the real cause of the disease. It is a tiny plant or germ, so small that it has to be magnified many hundred times to be seen at all. This tiny plant is known as the "germ" or "bacillus" of con-
