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

the closing of the model schools. My arguments years ago was, and now is that it was far better to have teach ers, some of whom may not have had the normal school professional training, than to adopt a system calling for a mare expensive training and resulting in the fact that one-third of our schools are in the hands of untrained teachers. I may add, Sir, that I have always had great faith in the work of our model schools; they were in charge of competent and experienced men, men of five, ten, fifteen, and twenty years' actual experience, men who were trained in what is by all

odds the best of all universities—the university of actual experience. They were doing efficient and successful work. These schools were easy of access to intending teachers. A poor man's son or daughter was not obliged to leave home and reside for a

war in one of our cities to obtain professional training. Instead, however, Sir, of continuing these model schools until at least a sufficient number of eachers were guaranteed for the proince, practically all the mode chools in Old Ontario were close

with the deplorable results already referred to. The net result is that the cost of education in the rural districts is increased fifty or seventy-five per cent., and on the average the character and quality of the teaching is far lower than it was ten years ago.


