PLEA FOR YOUNG MEN

WORK BEING CARRIED ON BY THE Y.M.C.A.

Strong Appeal Made by Rev. R. J. M. Glassford at Chalmers Church on Sunday—Churches Have Been Too Long Asleep—Work Should be Supported.

One of the strongest appeals ever made in this city, in behalf of work among young men, was that given in Chalmers church, on Sunday morning, by Rev. R. J. M. Glassford, of Guelph, international field secretary of Sunday school work, who spoke for the Y.M.C.A., it being a special day in the city churches for the presentation of the work being carried on by this association.

The speaker said that the heart cry of today was in regard to what could be done for the young man. It was a crime for the people of the present age, with the many opportunities which presented themselves not to do something for young men and women. The Christian people and the churches he declared, had been too long asleep. It was indeed, a great pity, that the Y.M.C.A. had to go begging for help, when their intention was to uplift the young men. It would be a great thing when every person could grasp this vision. It was a great mistake to allow the young people to live through all the mysteries of life. Too often, it left a stain upon their lives. Parents so often were careless in the matter; they allowed their children to go right to the precipice, and then summon an ambulance, to pick up the remains. It was far better to look after the children when they were young, and this would prevent a great deal of trouble.

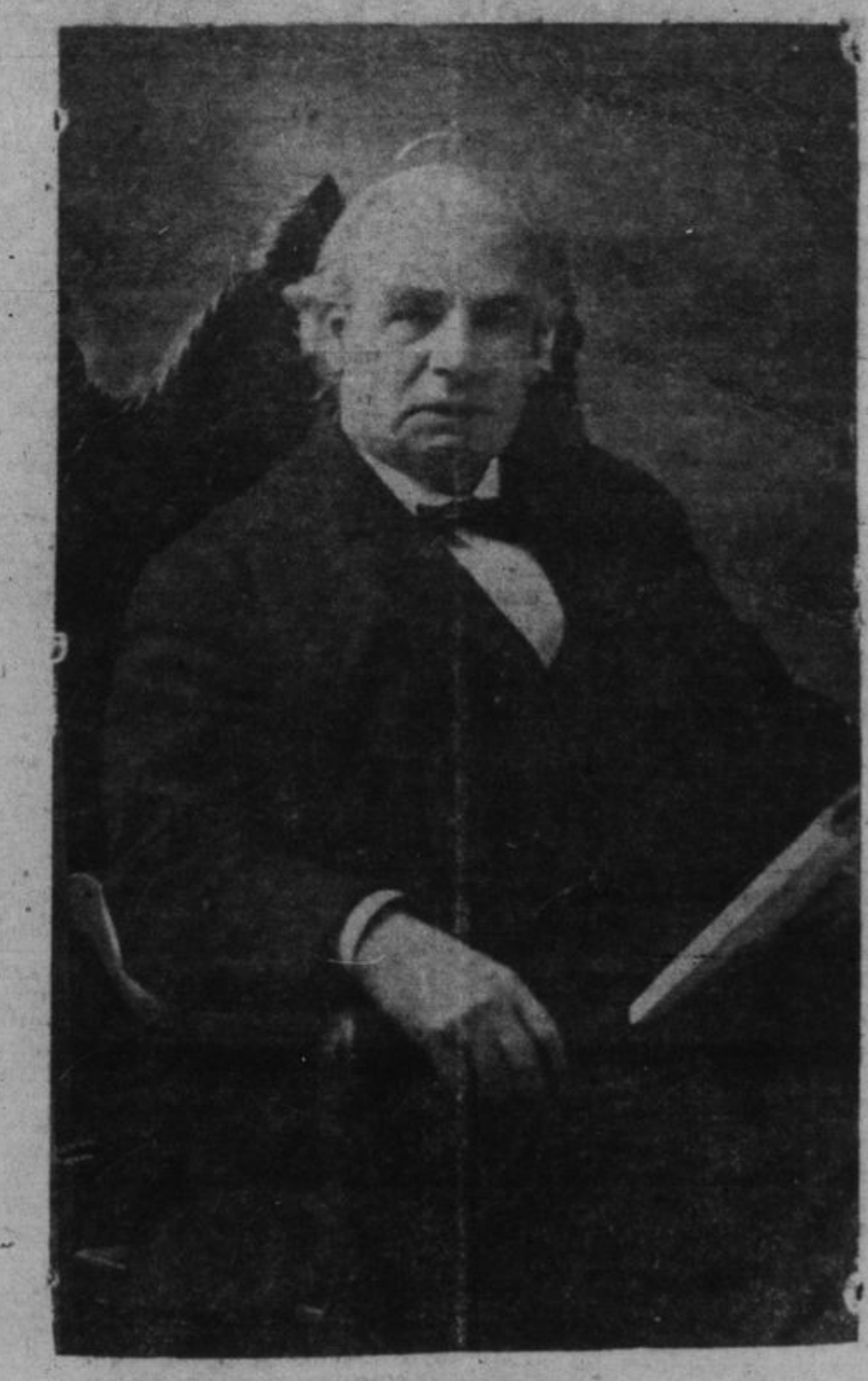
The work of the Sunday school and that of the Y.M.C.A. went along hand in hand. The saving of a young man might be the means of saving many others, as he would have an influence over others. This was something to which very little thought was given. Work among the young men should be practical, and carried on in a business like way. There appeared to be a weakness in the national life. There were three qualities which appeared to be dropping out. In the first place, there was reverence for age; in this respect, the Orientals were far ahead of us. There was a lack of righteousness. "The Farmers' Bank tragedy did not happen overnight," declared the speaker. "He pointed out that long ago, there had been an undermining of one man. Men were not responsible today. There were many men who did not care for another's disappointment. This new sense of responsibility must be recovered, and the only way that it might be done, was to start at the foundation, in the looking after the young men. The Y.M.C.A. stood for character. AN APPEAL FOR AID TWO MILLION CHINESE IN DANGER OF STARVING. Pitiful Scenes in China—Children Given Away by the Afflicted—Misery Increased by Cold and Snow. Washington, Feb. 13.—Unless relieved, two million people in China will die of starvation. This is a calamity predicted by American Consul-General Wilder at Shanghai, in a cablegram received from him by the American National Red Cross Society. The consul-general appeals for quick assistance for the suffering people, and says that a half million dollars is needed immediately. There will be no crops until the end of May and Chinese relief is inadequate, he adds. In describing the pitiful conditions Mr. Wilder says the scenes in the famine district are horrifying. Children are being given away by the afflicted people, dead lay by the roadside, and the misery of the sufferers is being increased by severe cold and snow. The famine area stretches over a territory 300 miles by 150 miles.

Imperial Preference. Mr. Balfour, writing to a correspondent, says he is rather surprised at the information the latter seems to have received with regard to an impression which prevails in Canada as to the attitude of the unionist party towards preference. This, Mr. Balfour declares, he could assure his correspondent has undergone no change, and so far as he was concerned, the development of the commercial treaty system throughout the world had strengthened his conviction—that imperial preference is a necessity.
