MUST RETURN CUP

THE ALLAN HOCKEY CUP HAS BEEN DEFAULTED.

Serious Cleavage in Amateur Hockey May Result—The O.H.A. Has No Champions Yet.

Toronto, Feb. 14.—The receipt here, this morning, of a letter from Secretary Northey, of the Allan hockey cup trustees, ordering the Ontario Hockey Association to return the Allan hockey cup to Montreal, forthwith, the Allan cup, having defaulted to Victoria, of Winnipeg, has aroused a tremendous protest here which may develop into a serious cleavage in amateur hockey throughout the dominion.
Northey's letter accuses the Ontario hockeyists of unsportsmanlike conduct in connection with their hesitation in giving up the cup. Secretary Hewitt, of the Ontario Association, would not say, this morning, what would be done with Northey's peremptory demand, but it is no secret that several influential members are advocating letting the Victoria and Allan cup trustees fight for the cup if they want it.
St. Michael's has not yet played a deciding game in its group, and it is argued they cannot fairly be asked to meet the Victoria till they do.

WORK OF THE Y.M.C.A.

The Money Campaign Has Been Inaugurated.

The board of directors of the Y. M. C. A. met last evening for three hours. The secretary presented quite a formidable list of names, which were gone over and allotted to the different directors who are satisfied the public will respond to the appeal for \$5,500, which is being asked for to carry on the work this year. It is proposed that there be two dates set at which time subscribers will be asked to pay. These dates are April 15th and October 15th. This will make it much better for the association. Quite a number of subscribers have expressed their appreciation of this move. A hearty response to the appeal to be made is expected. Noon-day lunches will be served every day to the board and friends who are helping, and reports given as to progress made. It is intended to wind the work up by Friday noon, if possible.

MISTAKEN IDENTITY

Caused Defeat of Congressman Washburn.

A searching investigation which has taken place since the United States elections, reveals the fact that Congressman Charles G. Washburn was defeated for re-election in Massachusetts, by a case of mistaken identity. It is now an open secret in that district that John A. Thayer was put on the ticket deliberately in order that he might catch votes intended for ex-Congressman John R. Thayer, who could not be induced to run. This scheme worked out beautifully, as it happened. John A. Thayer did little or no campaigning (his sworn opponent bill being \$100), while John R. Thayer went around to cattle shows and other places always mingling with the people and occasionally making a little speech in which he did not fail to ridicule the former aspirations of Congressman Washburn. In one town in Worcester county twelve republicans declared that they had voted for the old "fox hunter," meaning, of course, John R. Thayer. As Congressman Washburn had no suspicion of such a curious mixing of identity he took no steps to prevent it, but it appears that a few hundred postal cards sent throughout the district would have straightened things out so as to make him the next congressman from that district instead of Thayer. One Worcester county man declared that as it was really John R. who was elected, John R. ought to take the seat and suggests that the latter make a contest for it.

Coins 550 Years Old.

In digging a drain at Fakenham, Norfolk, a man has just found about two hundred gold nobles (a coin worth 6s. 8d.) of the reign of Edward III. The treasury has been communicated with and an inquest will be held.

The coins were struck either at the Calais or London mint. Some issued between 1351 and 1360, in addition to the titles of King of England, and Lord of Ireland, have that of King of France. Those issued between 1369 and 1399 have the title of Duke of Aquitaine. The nobles were almost pure gold, only had a grain of alloy being used. The design of the obverse is the king, armed and crowned, standing on a ship; from a masthead flies a streamer bearing the cross of St. George.

The value of the coins is probably some hundreds of pounds, and the man who made the discovery will receive a large share.—London Daily Mail.

THE QUEUE MUST GO

THIS IS THE CRY OF THE CHINESE.

Progressive Men All Through the Old Empire Cut Off Their Pigtails, Showing the Growth of the Modern Spirit.

Pekin, Feb. 14.—A curious agitation significant of the times is going on throughout China with regard to the queue. The pigtail is ridiculed by all progressives as an indication of backwardness, distinguishing the Chinese from all other civilized peoples. Cartoons appear regularly in the newspapers showing the advantage of the queue to the assistant of the headman in the act of decapitating a criminal or depicting the various other animals that wear the tail, the dog and the pig being in the foreground.
Editorials denounce the custom, and new groups of men and associations are daily falling into the line, of reform. Progressive military officers, newspaper men or employees of foreign consulates and agree to sacrifice their queues, and then hold a fire-cracker festival to celebrate the performance.

The movement indicates the change of ideas that has come over the nation's advanced men. It has been followed by hundreds in the treaty ports but in the conservative capital, where the official spirit prevails, the movement has received slight checks.

For instance, the movement among students of the Imperial university was speedily suppressed by the faculty giving to the first students appearing without the appendage one-third the number of demerits necessary for dismissal. On the other hand, a newspaper which printed the statement that the emperor dowager was against the change was suppressed for a week.

Pay Taxes in Kind.

The natives of the Congo pay their taxes in kind, as might be expected in a territory just beginning to be civilized. The value of domestic animals in that country is such that one wishes it were nearer Hamilton, in view of the high price of meat there. A bullock is valued at about 19s. 6d., a cow, £2 2s., a horse £3 15s., a sheep, 1s. 3d. The camel commands the highest price, viz. £4. The custom of payment in kind is not so remote as most persons would think. The Reverend the late Prof. Flint, of Edinburgh, we know, has stated that during the time he was professor of moral philosophy in St. Andrews he was accustomed to receive part of the emoluments of his chair in kind from the farms, belonging to the university. This would be prior to 1876, in which year he was translated to Edinburgh.

Montreal, Feb. 13.—About 900 head of butchers' cattle, 100 calves, 125 sheep and lambs, and 1,200 hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. The offerings of live stock at this market during the week were 1,700 cattle, 200 calves, 1,175 sheep and lambs, and 2,850 hogs. Trade was fair, with no changes to note in the prices of cattle, but hogs are lower.

Prime beef sold at 61c. to 62c. per lb.; pretty good animals, 5c. to 6c., and the common stock, 33c. to 41c. per lb. Calves sold at from 41c. to 7c. per lb. Sheep sold at about 41c. per lb.; lambs at 61c. to 62c. per lb. Good lots of hogs sold at about 71c. per lb.
