THE LESSON IS UNIQUE.

The Ottawa Citizen displays a spirit that is very remarkable at a time when some other papers are giving evidence of a panicky feeling. Our contemporary believes that the two ministers, assisted by their trade and statistical experts, are better qualified than any other Canadians to pass an opinion of real value on the merits of the case. These ministers assure the people that they have made a good bargain for Canada, and the Citizen feels bound to accept their judgment. There has been nothing so calming in the whole range of reciprocity literature. The average conservative paper is out against the government, proclaiming its acts as perfidious and unpatriotic, and insinuating that its commissioners are the sellers of the country. The Citizen sets the journalistic world a lesson in temperate counsel that is simply unique.

CANADA'S NATURAL RESOURCES.

What is the use of repeating an idea over and over again without justification. The Tory papers are denouncing the reciprocity pact because it proposes that Canada shall be robbed of her natural resources. These natural resources cannot be her gains, for these must be exported, (when in excess of the local demand), and go in any case to the highest bidder. The natural resources in pulpwood are under the control of the local governments, and there is no evidence that they will be sacrificed. The conservative governments in the provinces may be depended upon to co-operate against the federal government, as a matter of course, and the Quebec government has announced that there is no disposition on its part to modify the pulpwood regulations in the interest of any one or party. Sir Lomer Gouin has made this question clear by saying that in any legislation which his government takes or projects only consideration will be had for the good of Quebec and her people.

THE CANADIAN CLUB.

The Canadian Club movement has taken firm root in the dominion. Every progressive city from Victoria to Sydney has its organization. The growth of the movement has coincided with that rapid development of material prosperity and national self-confidence which has put Canada on the front street of the twenty century nations. Few can keep track of the many forward movements being made in the dominion, Vancouver's or Edmonton's experiments with the single tax, the experience of Guelph or Port Arthur in municipal ownership, the conservation movement, or the development of our international relations, without some such agency to bring before the citizens of Canadian thought and action and representative men from the Motherland and the United States. The Kingston club, now entering its second year, is making an effort to include in its membership every alert and progressive citizen. It is to be hoped that the young men especially will respond to the appeal and help to make the Kingston Canadian Club worthy in numbers and enthusiasm of the best conditions of the Limestone city.

Arrangements are being made for an attractive series of noon-day and evening addresses. J. S. Ewart gave, last week, a trenchant and clear-cut presentation of one view of Canada's national destiny; other points of view on this all-important issue will be given later. Sir George C. Gibbons, chairman of the International Waterways Commission, H. W. Richardson and Adam Shortt are among the first speakers arranged for.

PERFIDY OF SOME PEOPLE.

The board of trade in certain places are presuming to dictate to the government with regard to reciprocity. The meetings and the resolutions are influenced by manufacturers and bankers, whose interests are not affected by the trade proposal. This proposal is in the interest of the farmers, and they are practically told that they should not be so aggressive, that they should leave well enough alone because the manufacturers and their friends have things pretty much as they like at present and do not want a change.

The farmers may not amount to much, in the estimation of some politicians, but the agricultural voters can, when they like, make and unmake governments, and the government and the party that can ignore the North-West and its votes, or

start its calls and demands lightly, deserves the defeat that must be theirs. This reciprocity agreement is an experiment which can be tried for a year or two without dismay or damage. It is better than a treaty in that it can be abandoned at any time when it produces results that are not desired or expected.

The annexation bogey meanwhile will not alarm any one. Annexation was once preached by the party which now affects to be so much in fear of it, and the imperial preference was opposed by the men who, in parliament, keep over it as a thing which was dear to their hearts and is, in their opinion, in jeopardy. Any one who can be influenced by this performance must be an easy mark.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Whig's idea is that the majority shall rule only when it suits his purposes. In option law the minority rule, and he has virtually told the temperance people to dry up upon the three-fifths clause.

The lord mayor of Dublin on strike! That is the latest. The council cut down his salary, and he cut out the style, including the great banquet at which some people have been accustomed to blow themselves.

The legislature will legislate so that the municipalities can insist on pure milk being sold within them. What will it amount to unless the legislature makes it compulsory for the council to act.

The three-fifths clause has to be faced again in the legislature where Mr. Proudfoot will move for its amendment. The government may be wadded to its pet, but it cannot abuse the temperance people without causing trouble.

Mr. Bourassa is opposed to the Chamberlain idea of fiscal reform and favours reciprocity between Canada and the United States. The quasi approval of the nationalist leader is perhaps the worst thing that has yet happened to the trade agreement.

The old chap on the temperance deputation, who shook his fist in the face of Sir James Whitney, at the close of an interview, ran a serious risk of the dungeon. The idea of threatening the premier in his own halliwhack!

In view of present emergencies how fortunate the water department would have been if left with the \$10,000 which the council misappropriated a couple of years ago. The department will be going into debt now for repairs which it could have safely met if left alone.

So some of the senate members think there are too many old men in the upper chamber. What others have thought for a long time. What is the cure? No one will resign a life job, and its handsome emoluments, and there is no way of forcing him out. 'Tis a pity, true 'tis a pity, and a pity, 'tis true.

The Quebec government is creating a teachers' pension fund, and promising the beneficiaries an annual benefit of from \$75 to \$800. About 400 teachers will benefit. It is expected that this will make teaching more attractive. It is to be hoped that the fund, as in Ontario, will not be found inadequate and so closed to all but the older teachers.

It is estimated, and by William Frank, of Winnipeg, a prominent grain dealer, that reciprocity in trade, between the United States and Canada, will add a million dollars to the land values of the North-West. The western representatives who would oppose the trade arrangement, under these circumstances, may vote against it, but he will forfeit his political life in the transaction.

Who Did the Begging?

One of the most captivating arguments against the reciprocity agreement cuts two ways. There was no need, we are told, of being in such a hurry to make concessions, as the United States would have made these reductions any way; she has not made them for our sake, but for her own; why, then, did we need to go begging? Such is the argument. The first answer to it is that we did not go begging. If there was any begging, it was Brother Jonathan who did it. If the United States would have had to concede these reductions to her own people, without any dealing with us, it only shows that her boasted protection system has broken down, and that, far from being the source of that country's unparalleled prosperity, it is regarded by its people as an intolerable burden. As conditions in this country largely reflect, though in fainter degree, those of our neighbors, we are not surprised to find here a similar demand leading to similar results. The fact is that the United States has come to where she has to make some reductions, and so have we. That we should agree to make them is a way of letting the protectionists down easy.

The latest thing is to purchase pages in government papers to set forth in quasi-editorial forms its depending recourse to the well-known patriotism of the people. We actually find a silly appeal to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, to save the country from absorption by wrecking this trade agreement, in a full page of the Toronto Globe. This recalls an attempt that was made some years ago to reach the people by printing a newspaper here called the Globe in close imitation of the Globe of Toronto, which was circulated, gratis, far and wide.

Valuable to Each Other.

The best thing that can happen for the United States for generations to come is to have a great and strong state growing up on the north beside the union. There is enough difference between the two nations to make them equally valuable to each other for stimulation, healthy rivalry, criticism, different ways of working out destiny, but always with the most friendly relations and the sense that they bear in their arms more of human hope and happiness than any other two countries on the footstool.

It is impertinence, folly or knavery, or a combination of all three, to thrust the notion of annexation into any debate of a subject of common interest to the union and the dominion.
