OLD BASEBALL DAYS RECALLED BY A FORMER PICTON PLAYER.

Who Tells about the Great Play. Made by "Bunty" Carson, Who Caught for Kingston in the Seventies. A. D. Paton, of Lindsay, writes the Whig recalling former baseball days. He says: "In the year 1873 to 1876 inclusive I was located in Picton in the capacity of manager for the Dominion Telegraph company. During this time (in 1874 or '75) the Kingston St. Lawrence baseball club, then our Canadian international representatives, had a date off and ran an excursion to Picton by steamer to play the Picton team. 'Bob' Ellibeck was captain of the Kingston professional nine and I had that honor for Picton.

"Kingston's greatest pitcher at that time was 'Wells.' I think he was secured from Ithaca, N.Y. Your own 'Bunty' Carson caught and the Americans at that time or since have had little or nothing on Carson. The rule of the game at that time allowed the catcher to drop the third strike and force the runners. This the opportunity presented itself, and Carson certainly took advantage of it. Picton had a man on every base, your humble servant being at second. 'Jack' Cunningham was up batting for Picton. The pitcher got three strikes on him. Carson dropped the ball purposely, picked it up, put his foot on home plate, threw to third, third to second and second to first, before the batter reached there, disposing of four men in about as many seconds.

THEY SCRUB EACH OTHER. Daily Bath of the Pupils in Copenhagen's Public Schools. Youth's Companion. Denmark is one of the cleanest little countries imaginable. In a Copenhagen public school one may see an interesting sight. Mounting the spotless stone staircase to the first flight, every morning you may see at eight o'clock the children assemble and answer to their names and then march to a dressing-room. Here they undress, and each child neatly folds its clothes and puts the tidy little bundle on the floor. Then the children go into a small square room with shelves all around, and on these shelves are innumerable wooden tubs, such as we in America use for washing, with two iron bands around them. Everything is in immaculate order. The teacher gives each child a tub, and he or she takes it into an immense and well-lighted washroom.

ADVANCE IN SCHOOLS. Hon. Dr. Pyne Reports Increased Salaries and Better Teachers.

Toronto, Feb. 24.—"A distinct improvement in several highly important particulars is noted by Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education, in his annual report, just issued. There were 779 more first and second class teachers, with 96 fewer "thirds" than the year before, as the result of opening three more normal schools and closing model schools. In urban schools the average salary of teachers \$1,069 and \$632 for male and female, increase of \$14 and \$16 respectively. In rural schools the salaries were \$484 and \$399, increase of \$22 and \$17 respectively. The teachers increased by 189. The urban attendance increased by 6,078, but the rural schools decreased by 29,997.

FINGERNAIL AS BLOOD TEST. Scientists Make This the Determination of Racial Origin. Baltimore, Feb. 24.—Johns Hopkins physicians, in an endeavor to determine scientifically the race of a child, to-day, examined Luella Leftridge, an eleven-year-old girl, who is trying to obtain freedom from a negro institution in which she has been held nearly seven years. The examination was made with a view to determining whether the girl is white or a negro. The main point to be settled is what really can be considered the line of demarcation between a white person and a negro. In this case it was stated that all the accepted tests for the presence of negro blood save one had failed. That one is the presence of a black line across the one of the girl's fingernails just around the arc known as the "half moon."

WOMEN OVERTURN SEATTLE. They Defeat All But Three Candidates. Seattle, Wash., Feb. 24.—For the second time in a month, the votes of women have worked a revolution in Seattle. In yesterday's primary to choose eighteen candidates for councilmen to be second time in a month the votes of the city followed up their vote of February 7th, which ousted Mayor Hiram C. Gill and his appointive officers, by defeating all but three candidates who were accused of being close to the late Gill administration.

KILLED HIMSELF FOR GIRL. Theatre Owner Shot Himself and Ticket-Seller. Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 24.—In an alley in the rear of a nickel arcade on the south side last night, Henry Kemp, former proprietor of the amusement place, shot a ticket seller, Marie Steinke, through the hand and then killed himself by sending bullets through his head and breast. All that will ever be known about the shooting is told by the girl, who is only sixteen years old. She said Kemp asked her to go to the alley, as he wanted to tell her something. As soon as the two met, Kemp began the shooting. Kemp was married and leaves a widow and two children.

Eggs Cheap in New York. New York, Feb. 24.—The price of eggs in New York is the lowest February quotation in forty-one years. Owing to unprecedented receipts from the west market men are quoting fresh eggs as low as twenty cents a dozen, and the prospect, according to authorities in the trade, is for a fall of price to fifteen cents a dozen before March 1st.
