GUN-RUNNING IN PERSIA. Fifty Thousand Rifles Smuggled Through Gulf Ports in Year.

Giving to the enormous growth of the smuggling of arms and ammunition into Persia and Afghanistan, mainly by way of the Persian gulf, last year, when it is estimated that over a million rounds of ammunition and 20,000 magazine rifles were conveyed into the Amir's dominions.

Through the bulk of these rifles ultimately found their way into Afghanistan, they are also found to be in large numbers in Beluchistan, Russian and Chinese Turkestan, Persia, and even so far away as Tibet.
