WILL CARRY IT OUT

SIR FREDERICK BORDEN SPEAKS ON FRENCH'S REPORT.

The Artillery Will be Recruited and Increased to Full Strength—Necessary Armament to be Supplied.

Ottawa, Feb. 24.—"We intend to carry out Sir John French's report so far as the whole force in Canada is concerned; perhaps not as rapidly as we would like, but not less rapidly than we have been progressing in the department in the past seven or eight years. The artillery will be recruited and increased to the strength it should have, and the cavalry and infantry also. The necessary armament will be supplied as rapidly as possible, and divisions made as the general report suggested."

This announcement was made by Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia and defence, to the annual meeting of the Canadian Artillery Association in the railway committee rooms of the house, yesterday afternoon. Sir Frederick Borden stated that the report had been eminently pleasant reading to him, insofar as the artillery of Canada was concerned, and he thought should be very satisfactory to the militia as a whole. Gen. French had not considered in his report, and had not been expected to do so, the difficulties existing in Canada as regards the forming of regiments. He had been expected to report on the force as he found it, as a unit ready to take the field, and he had done so.

REPORTED TO SENATE

REGARDING AFFAIRS OF THE FARMERS' BANK.

Dominion Government Sees No Reason for Appointing a Royal Commission—No Relief for Shareholders.

Ottawa, Feb. 24.—According to a reply given in the Commons yesterday by Hon. Mr. Fielding, to a question by David Henderson, there will be no royal commission appointed to investigate the affairs of the Farmers' Bank and the government does not think it will be wise public policy to relieve the shareholders from double liability. "The government," said Mr. Fielding, "has no reason to doubt that the exercise of the powers given to the liquidators, and the proceedings now engaging the attention of the courts of justice in Toronto, will lead to a full investigation into the disclosure of all the affairs of the bank. Should anything arise later to indicate that the investigation is insufficient, the question as to appointing a royal commission can be further considered. The government deeply regrets that a number of people, who are not well able to bear the loss, are likely to suffer from the failure of the bank, but, in the judgment of the government, it would not be wise to exempt them from the provisions of the banking act."

WILL TAKE NO ACTION

HALLS OF QUEEN'S ARTS CONCURSUS HELD ON THURSDAY EVENING.

Canadian Chemists Meet in Convention—The Final Results in the Wrestling Contests.

It is doubtful if ever in the annals of Queen's courts a more just justice was meted out than that contained in the decision handed down Thursday night by Chief Justice Jull, the supreme dignitary of the Arts Concursus virtutis et iniquitatis. The six students appearing before the court were arraigned on charges decidedly unbecoming to university men. Every consideration was shown the prisoners, and there was no attempt to intimidate on the part of those in authority. Several decided to be tried by judge, while some of the cases were heard by a jury. N. MacDonald, assisted Chief Justice Jull. The prosecution was ably conducted by Messrs. Tulley and Selye. R. MacKinnon acted in the capacity of court crier, and William Garvoek as clerk of the court. The oath upon which the evidence was given was as follows:—By the hunk of concrete in the Kingston handly's pie do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth."

REPORTED TO SENATE

THE CANADIAN RECIPROCIITY BILL TO-DAY.

Quite a Surprise at Washington—Committee Makes No Recommendations—What Will be the Outcome?

Washington, Feb. 24.—The committee on finance of senate to-day washed its hands of the Canadian reciprocity bill by reporting same to the senate without recommendation by a vote of six to seven. This was rather a surprising development, but it is understood to be necessary to prevent the smothering of the bill altogether by that body. It is possible to get bill under discussion in the entire house, where it now will appear just as it left President Taft's hands. The possibility now is that the senate will talk the bill to death owing to the early dissolution of the present congress.
