WITH THE CHURCHES

MISSION SERMONS IN ST. PAUL'S AND ST. LUKE'S. Rev. Canon Gould, M.D., Secretary of M.S.C.C., in St. Paul—Rev. F. H. Sproule Spoke on Responsibility.

Rev. Canon Gould, M.D., general secretary of the M.S.C.C., preached in St. Paul's church, Sunday evening, and dealt with the subject of the missionary society of the church of England, in Canada. He referred to the great change which has taken place in this work, in the last ten years. Ten years ago, he said, a sermon on missions, would mean a collection for funds. What had been the result of the work of the society? It was simply that the church itself was organized for missionary purposes. Every member of the church in Canada was necessarily a member of the missionary society. The object in delivering a missionary sermon, was that of renewing faith in the work, where it had weakened, and to add strength to it. Everyone must have some faith in mission. The man who claimed to be a Christian, and did not believe in missions, was contradicting himself. How could a man claim to be following Christ, when he would not follow Him beyond his own parish or beyond his own diocese. Canon Gould spoke at some length on the work he was engaged in for many years, in Palestine. Canon Gould was the preacher at matins, in St. George's cathedral.

At St. Luke's Church. R. W. Allen, M.A., assistant secretary of the Canadian Missionary Society, occupied the pulpit in St. Luke's church, on Sunday evening, and delivered a masterly discourse on the subject of missions. In part, he said: "It seems unintelligible to me that any one calling himself a Christian should not believe in missions. One cannot be a genuine Christian unless he believes and supports missions. It seems to me that God intended from the first that all people should know Him, for it gives us a chance to work for Him here by telling those who do not know Him of the saving knowledge of the truth. I regard it the greatest privilege that could have been bestowed upon mortal beings that we should work in conjunction with Him and for the same purpose. It is His command that we should go into the world and proclaim the gospel to everyone, and if we do not live up to this command, we are not serving Him the way we should."

Men Made for Responsibility. During his discourse in Princess Street Methodist church last evening, Rev. F. H. Sproule, B.A., dwelt at some length on "Talents and Responsibility." He pointed out that the inhabitants of this earth were not meant to slide along in their everyday life without having some duty devolve upon them. They were not made to shirk responsibility, but on the other hand they were made to assume it. Men, to-day cannot find a situation that is worth having that has not some responsibility connected with it, and the speaker said he would not give much for a situation that did not in a measure a certain amount of responsibility. "The big corporations are looking for men who are ready to assume their responsible positions," and they are exacting, inasmuch as they require the best that is in men. They want men of sobriety, for in this day and generation they are alive to the fact that unless a man is a teetotaler in every sense of the word, they are unable to get the best out of him. It is so in the Christian life also. People to-day cannot follow Christ without having a certain amount of responsibility and work to do. He had heard some people say that if they could not follow Christ without making mistakes that there was no use in trying to keep Him in view as an example. Peter and John two of the most outstanding figures in the Bible both made mistakes, and yet, they were able to make their lives count for something. In concluding he said he was glad whenever he saw people assuming their responsibility the way they should and were trying to make the most of their talents.
