### QUEEN'S CHALLENGE

**TO VARSITY TO MEET IN ATHLETIC EVENTS.**

Presbyterians Resent the Slur of Toronto University Journal—Will Meet Varsity Under Latter's Officials.

In the last issue of Varsity, the organ of Toronto University, it was intimated that Queen's had won the assault-at-arms last year by almost stealing it away from the other colleges. To-day the following telegram was sent to Toronto—

"Boxing, Fencing and Wrestling Club, of Toronto University—Have noted Varsity's reference to last year's assault-at-arms and have heard that you may not enter a team for Saturday. We phoned McGill to postpone event until 11th of March, but arrangements had been made and it was too late. We would like to meet you under officials of whose selection we had no voice, and will be disappointed if you do not send team to Montreal for Saturday, March 4th. (Signed) Boxing, Fencing and Wrestling Club, of Queen's University."

This is a fair challenge. Last spring Varsity made childish charges concerning Queen's, because the latter won the championship. Queen's has never won any athletic event unfairly, less dishonorably, and the sooner Varsity gets acquainted with that fact the better. The only fault to be found with Queen's men is that they are altogether too generous to rivals, and opponents. Just imagine Toronto university offering to postpone an event if an opponent was disabled! Would Toronto do it? No indeed!

Some time ago, a Queen's debater in an intercollegiate contest fell ill. Queen's asked a postponement of the debate. Did Varsity grant the request? Well, certainly not. Varsity won the debate because Queen's had to send another man at the last minute.

Last winter Toronto university had some loudly-touted champion athletes, who came down here to compete with the Presbyterian Goliaths, and were defeated. Varsity has been sore ever since.

### GIRLS OF GANANOQUE

The city council has entered into an agreement with the local officers of the Salvation Army to furnish a shelter for children taken off the streets, until their cases have been enquired into. The shelter will be at the officers' quarters on Bagot street. The city will pay the army fifty dollars a year and provide the necessary meals for those taken in charge. Hereafter, young girls and boys who are inclined to run streets at night, and get into trouble will be taken in charge, and their parents notified. The Children's Aid Society is going to make an aggressive campaign.
