GENERAL SEAMEN'S STRIKE. International Association Will Meet at Antwerp on Friday.

New York, March 3.—A Paris cable says: The international marine congress, which meets at Antwerp, to-day, may well be considered with anxiety. However, the chairman of the congress, may appear, this meeting, convened by the International Seamen's Association, threatens to bring about a general strike of seamen the world over unless the ship owners' powerful organization, the International Shipping Federation, shall give way to the men's demands.

Chief among the seamen's demand is one for uniform scale of wages. The present rate of pay varies to such a degree that sailors and stokers signing at London for voyage to America receive wages from twenty to twenty-five per cent. higher than those paid for the same voyage to men engaged at another port. Various other demands are to be considered.
