CAN'T GO TOO HIGH PROPOSES TO LIMIT SKYSCRAPERS' HEIGHT.

New York Commission on Congestion of Population Would Restrict Buildings to Fourteen Stories.

New York, March 3.—Future New York skyscrapers would be held to a height of fourteen stories, or 140 feet, and other drastic restrictions would be placed upon building operations if recommendations contained in the report, to-day, of the New York-city commission on congestion of population are enacted into law.

The commission found that one-sixth of Greater New York's population is housed on one eighty-seventh of the city's area.

CONSUMPTION; TUBERCULOSIS. Educational Leaflet Issued by Kingston Association.

"We are all diseased. And, with our surfeiting and wanton hours, have brought ourselves into a burning fever."

Tuberculosis infection may take place at any age. It usually occurs during childhood. The germs lodge in the lymph glands. Fully sixty per cent. of children during the school age have some enlarged glands in their necks which usually means tubercle bacilli in their lymph glands.

INJURES PLANT LIFE COMPLAINT AT OTTAWA ABOUT HYPOCHLORITE.

Its Presence in the Water Said to Delay Plants Blooming—An Investigation to be Made.

Ottawa, March 2.—A complaint from J. H. Dunlop, a Toronto florist, that the hypochlorite treatment of the water there is proving injurious to plant life, is being investigated by the experimental farm experts.

The subject is an important one, not only to Toronto, but to Montreal, Ottawa and other cities using the "hypo" system of water purification hence the interest of the dominion authorities.

"Mr. Dunlop, who is a grower of much experience, has noticed a sickness about his plants, which he claims has become apparent only since Toronto started to use hypochloritized water, and consequently attributes this sickness and delay in blooming to the treatment of the water."

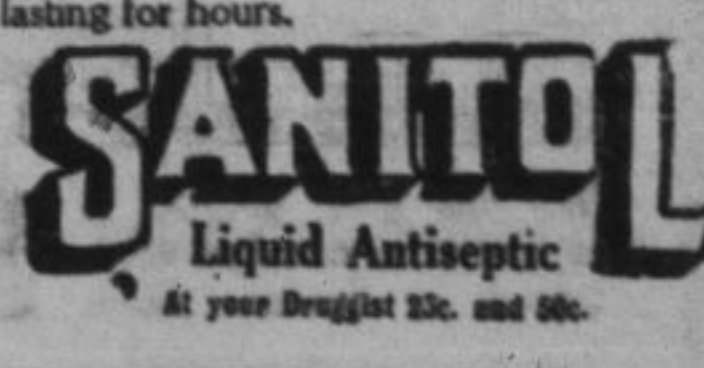

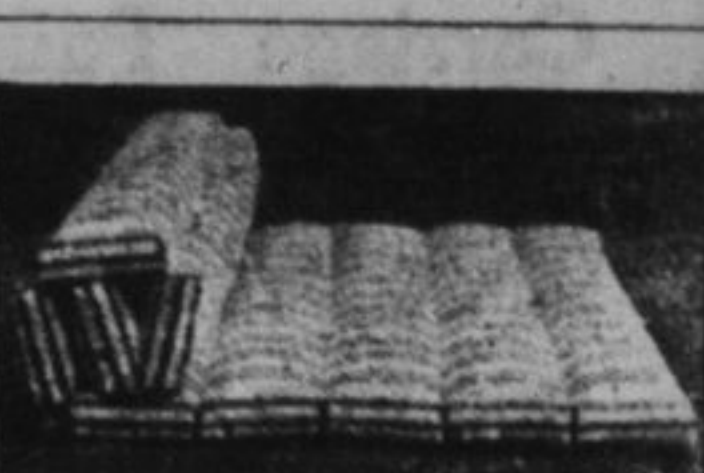
