Killing Cougars Saves Deer. From the Portland Oregonian. It is estimated that every cougar

in the state causes the death of at least fifty deer during the year. Some expert hunters maintain that a big as many as 100 deer in a single year. The estimate that the lives of 500 deer have been saved through the killing of nine of these wild beasts is regarded as conservative.

The trip of Winters and Thompson was undertaken for the purpose of killing off as many cougars as possible in two weeks, and they returned bringing nine skins as trophies. The huntsmen have already sold the largest skins, one of which measures eight feet seven inches in length and the other almost eight feet.
