THE SPORT REVIEW

GRANITES WON SENIOR CITY LEAGUE HONORS.

Defeated Portsmouth by 5 to 3—The Collegiate Defeated Granites for the Junior Championship, 10 to 5.

The two championship games which brought the City Hockey League to a close at the covered rink last evening, were well attended and the crowd which congregated there got their worth of the admission fee. The ice was in good condition and the class of hockey which was pulled off was pleasing to the followers of the two teams. Granites won the senior and Collegiate the junior.

The first game, which started at 7.30 o'clock, was between the junior Granites and K.C.I., for the W. W. Gibson trophy, and the cup will adorn the halls of the Collegiate for this season, as the students took their opponents into camp to the tune of 10 to 5. The Collegiate can give young 'Jimmie' Stewart, their kid goal keeper, the credit for the game being theirs, as his work in the nets was nothing short of marvellous. He stopped everything that came his way, and time and time again, when the Granite forwards rushed in past the defence, they failed to tally on account of his brilliant work.

The Collegiate deserved to win, for they played better hockey all the way through than their opponents. They also worked the three-man combination, once with telling effect. The half time score was 5 to 2 in favor of Collegiate and in the second half they tallied as many as they did in the first. At the beginning of the game Granites had the better of the play, the score being 2 to 1 at one time, but the students spurted and with the scoring of their second goal the barriers between the two teams was broken down and never after that were the Collegiate in danger. Granites shot times without number at the Collegiate goal, but young Stewart was right there with the goods and the rubber had to travel some to get past him.

The second game, in which Granite seniors proclaimed their license to be called champions for 1911, started as soon after the first one as the teams could be got together. The game was not by any means a good exhibition of hockey, although toward the last the teams settled down to good hard playing, and when the Granites were leading by three goals, when the score was five to two, the Portsmouth team tore around the ice like mad, and although they scored one goal, they lost the championship by two, the final score being 5 to 3. Close, hard checking characterized the game all through. Frontenac men on the Portsmouth team were lined up against their team mates on the Granites, and as each knew the other's tactics, it was hard for anyone to get away. Portsmouth had the stonewall defence of the Frontenacs, in the person of Davidson and McCammon, but their work was not so effective as it was in the junior O.H.A. games. Lined up against them were Brouse and Hyland, with Marchand in goal. Marchand's work for the Granites saved them, the situation, for many were the close shaves which he had after the opponents had got past the defence. Nicholson, captain of the Granites, is a speedy and effective man. He is full of daring and never loses a chance to go in and check an opponent, no matter how large. He was certainly the backbone of the team last night. Brouse, who played rover for the Granites, was never in better form, and showed his team mates that he could play as well against them as he could with them. Hyland showed his old-time ability and played a better game last night than he did here with the Frontenacs against Peterboro. Ainslee, in centre, was a whirlwind, but his fast skating did not seem to count for much. Weicker, the right wing man of the team, was also fast and the way he checked McCammon and Davidson was really good to see. Hughes, the other wing man, was speedy and aggressive, and used his size with good advantage. Boyle, in goal for Portsmouth, was good, and although he did not have so much to do as Marchand, played well. McCammon and Davidson did not show their right form and could not get away with the puck. The players seemed to bunch up a great deal and no one could get away. Reid and Labush, of the Collegiate team, who played rover and wing, have played to better advantage, although they showed up well. Gratton in centre, showed good form, although he has been in better condition. Dennison, on the wing, played a good game and got away with the puck several times, but was checked when about to score.

At half time the score was two all. About eight minutes after play in the second half, Granites scored their first goal and followed up a few minutes later with another, and things looked blue for Portsmouth. They got their fifth one before Portsmouth commenced to score, and they only got time to land one before the gong sounded.

Toward the close of the second half Weicker got slammed into the boards and got a bad cut over the eye. Nicholson got his chest ripped open when he fell on Davidson's skate. The game was very rough, and frequent two minute penalties were handed out for scrapping.

Everyone had picked Portsmouth to win, but they were doomed to disappointment. No word has as yet been received from Montreal as to when the game will be played there, but it will likely be some evening next week.

All Want to Play Frontenacs.

Secretary Hewitt, of the O.H.A., wired James T. Sutherland, yesterday, to say there are about 500 players north and west of Toronto who want to play on the all-star team, Saturday, in Toronto, against Frontenacs. This looks like one of two things, the players either think it will be an honor to go up against the champions, or else they think it will be a leather in their cap to be on the team that beat them. This game should be a cinch for the champions, for what can seven men who have never played together before do to a team like this. Excitement seems to run high all the game, and no doubt, a large number will go up. One hundred and fifty reserved seats have been held for the Kingston contingent.
