BATH ROAD BEAVERS DEFEATED GLENBURNIE

For Championship of Township Hockey League by Three Goals to Two—Collegiate and Tarsity III. Play Final Junior Game This Evening.

The maidens smiled a smile of extreme satisfaction, the mothers patted their husbands on the backs, and the fathers and sons vied with each other to see who could yell the loudest at the Palace rink Thursday afternoon when Bath Road Beavers won from the Glenburnie Ramblers by the close score of 3 to 2 in the game which practically decided the township hockey championship.

The game was a struggle to excess on account of the heavy condition of the ice. The Beavers had wrought havoc with it and while the play was going on it cut up and formed a slush which made it very difficult to do anything. The players could not do themselves justice as they could scarcely skate, shoot, pass, or keep on their feet.

The play was very even, neither team seeming to have any advantage, although, if anything, the Bath Road team forced the play more than their opponents. At half time the score stood 2 to 1 in favor of the Ramblers, but they would not extend a sou to back their team, for the Bath Road supporters were so confident of winning that they were willing to bet any money that their team would win even though they were one goal behind.

Barry, the fast centre of the Beavers, opened up the scoring about twelve minutes after the gong sounded, by a shot from in front of the goal. Bath Road supporters raised a blood-curdling yell, which was drowned in a still greater one from the throats of the Glenburnie rooters when McCallum scored on a pass from Smith.

For fifteen minutes after the teams went on the ice after the face-off in the second half neither could score. The supporters of the Bath Road team were beginning to get restless, although their confidence never wavered. "Long Bill" Greer tied the score on a pass from Gordon Cliff, having regained only to those claims of which he shall then have notice.

BOARD OF WORKS

TO HOLD SPECIAL SESSION CONCERNING ROADS.

Will Decide Whether to Adopt a Four-year Scheme—To Change By-law Respecting Sanding of Walks.

The board of works, yesterday afternoon, discussed the question of road building, but decided to hold a special evening session next week, to go fully into the matter. It will be decided whether to recommend to the city council a scheme of road construction to extend over four years, or to just outline a scheme for the present year.

The committee will make an inspection of walks about April 1st. The engineer reported that during the winter it had cost \$200 to sand the walks of the city. Ald. Bailey wanted the by-law changed to provide that the walks should be sanded by the works department.

Two tenders were received for the purchase of the department's old stone crusher. One was for \$105 and the other \$100. The board decided not to sell the crusher, as the offers were too small.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent).
