IN NEED OF REPAIRS

REPORT ON THE CHATHAM FIRE ENGINE

As Result of the Test Made a Few Days Ago—Information Will be Sent on to the City Council—Ladder Truck Needed for Department.

There was very little business before the members of the fire and light committee on Friday afternoon, and as a result, the meeting was not a very lengthy one. The chairman, Ald. Givens, presided, and the other members of the committee present, were Alds. McCarthy, Fair, Hoag and Fraser.

A report was submitted to the committee, by Alexander Milne, who recently made a test of the Chatham engine, which has been located at the lower fire station. He reported having made the usual steam and cold water tests, as well as a personal inspection. Some repairs were necessary, but if they were carried out the engine would then be just as good as new.

The recommendation was made that a new boiler be secured for the engine.

It is estimated that the cost of the repairs needed will amount to about \$1,400. On motion of Ald. Fraser, it was decided to send the report of Mr. Milne to the city council, for the information of the aldermen.

The great need of a ladder truck was impressed upon the members by Fire Chief Armstrong. The department needs such a truck, and one will probably be secured, if the funds will permit, as it was felt that under the present circumstances, one was absolutely necessary.

There was some discussion relative to new hydrants and new electric lights, but no action was taken. The location of the new electric lights has to be decided upon, when they are purchased.

Ald. McCarthy is very anxious to have what he terms many of the "dark corners," in Cataract ward, given some light, and Ald. Fraser is also out to secure more light for his people in Cataract ward.

No action was taken in regard to a proposition for the installation of a new fire alarm system. Information received on the question, will be filled for reference.
