PLETHORA OF MONEY
REDUCTION OF INTEREST RATE CONTEMPLATED.

Easy Money for Three Months—Band of England's Rate Has Been Reduced to Three Per Cent.
New York, March 13.—Some of the leading trust companies of the United States are meditating a reduction in the rate of interest paid to depositors because of the plethora of money which is now in evidence throughout the world. President Kroch, of the Equitable Trust company, says that the Equitable will probably make a reduction at an early date.
Toronto, March 13.—Toronto financiers and banking authorities are not surprised at the despatch from New York. Alexander Laird, general manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, said that there was sufficient demand in Canada to use up all the available funds the banks have at present. He had every reason to believe that very easy money conditions will prevail for the next three months. The Bank of England rate was reduced to three per cent. on Thursday and money critics believe that the tremendous world's gold production and a slackening of commercial enterprises means a period of extremely low interest returns.

KING WINS WITH ORATORY.
Britain's Ruler Certain to Make an Impression on Indian Subjects.
The strange fashion of diplomatic etiquette has rendered it necessary for King George and Queen Mary to proceed to India all the way by sea, since it would be impossible, according to European custom, for their majesties to take either the Marseilles or Brindisi route before they have made their official visits to the capitals of the countries that lie upon these routes. However favorable an impression King George may create upon his Indian subjects personally, he is certain to please them with his oratory, for the King is a fine speaker.

The purity of his majesty's diction when he opened his first parliament is still commented upon, and one noble lord pointedly remarked that it is doubtful whether the King's English was ever better spoken from the throne.

While the king's oratorical abilities are familiar to his subjects it is not so generally known that he is a capital extemporaneous speaker. For example, on one occasion in opening a banquet he began—
"When I came here I had quite a beautiful speech committed to memory so that I thought I could repeat it backward, if necessary. But alas! these charming surroundings have driven every word out of my head, and I am as helpless as a ship which has lost its rudder. However, here goes," and forthwith he plunged into a spontaneous address so full of happy compliment and rollicking humor that his audience was alternately delighted and convulsed.

The king has offered White Lodge to Prince and Princess Alexander of Teck, and they will take up their residence there as soon as the present extensive alterations have been completed. Some time ago Lord Ferquhar intimated that he did not desire to retain possession of this residence, which will suit Prince Alexander admirably, who finds that his military duties require him in London more often than before and also that his present quarters, in Henry H. Tower, at Windsor, are getting too cramped. Thus White Lodge, so long associated with the name of Teck, will once more be the home of that family.

King George's Linen.
The lord steward of the household of King George of England has just affixed his signature to the inventory of the royal linen. The total value of the linen at Buckingham palace is placed at about \$40,000.

The linen room is on the third floor of the palace; the walls are lined with linen presses. Two presses contain nothing but tablecloths, another table napkins; in four others there are nothing but sheets, while vast piles of towels, bedspreads, doilies, cushion covers, bolster and pillow cases are stored in the remaining presses. Some tablecloths for use in the state dining room are over a hundred years old. The royal arms are woven in the centre and at each corner.

All the linen it given out by the chief linen maid as it is required, and for each article she gives out she must receive a duplicate of it in return. She has two assistants.

The greater part of the laundry work for Buckingham palace is done under contract.

SANDBANKS EATING UP THE PROPERTY.
Sale of the Famous Evergreen House in Prince Edward County.
Pictou, Ont., March 11.—Because of the fast encroaching sands, which threaten to crowd it out of existence, the Evergreen House, the well-known hotel at the Sandbanks, Prince Edward county's summer resort has been sold at auction for the ridiculously low price of \$160. It was knocked down to the highest bidder, John W. Whittam. The property originally consisted of the summer hotel and three acres of land. Of recent years the sandbanks have been travelling so fast that they have now almost covered the three acres. Only the corner where the house stands remains uncovered. Within a dozen yards of the back door a sandbank a mile in extent and sixty feet high is slowly but surely moving forward, covering up a fine cedar grove, and in a year or so will bear down upon the house. It will not be long until the site where the Evergreen stood will be pointed out to summer tourists as one of the interesting sights of the famous sandbanks.
