

THIS DISTRICT.

Likely to Cause Greater Shortage of Farm Help-Great Demand All Over the Country for Mechanics-Rush Earlier Than Usual.

The great west is calling many men from this district. Quite a few have left within the past few weeks, and according to the reports of the railroad officials, there is likely to be quite a rush until the end of April, when the cheap rates for settlers will expire. Ticket agents have been busy giving out information regarding rates, etc.

The majority going out to the west are young men, but in some cases whole families are going out, taking all their household goods with them, with the intention of locating there. Not only are men going out from this district in quite large numbers, but reports go to show that all along the line, there is a general move westward. The effects of the migration are likely to be quite serious to both the farmers and the manufacturers, as it will cause a great shortage of help. Farm help has been very scarce for

some years, and this will mean that it will be harder than ever to get help. Every season some of the farmers have a very difficult time to secure men. The call to the west is reaching so many. Just last week four carloads of settlers' effects left Kingston over the Kingston & Pembroke railway, and the C.P.R., for the west. Those leaving of hybridization, and all his adult life law. 
