This embodies two points, first, the re-opening of Russian consulates at the points specified in the tremth of 1881, and, second, the establishment of free trade in certain products, including tea, in fulfilment of article 12 of the same treaty. These two points are the ones which it was announced, on February 23rd, could be easily adjusted, but China's second reply completely reversed the conciliatory attitude of the prince regent, which had led the Russian minister to telegraph to his government an assurance of China's compliance with Russia's demands.

TION PURPOSES.

Ontario Government Has a Reforestation Plan-County Councils May Purchase Waste Lands.

Toronto, March 14.-The further supplementary estimates for the province were tabled in the legislature by Hon. A. J. Matheson, yesterday afternoon. The total amount asked for is \$701,-512, more than half of which is for colonization roads. The rest is made up of expenditures on various public works, salary increases, annuities and other matters, for which provision was not made in the first estimates

The colonization roads of the province will require during the year approximately \$367,214, in addition to the amount voted in the main estimates. Of this amount \$144,397 goes to a one-legged man for a walking to the northern division, embracing a great part of New Ontario. The Temiskaming district gets 891,750, the western division, \$27,225, and the eastern, 875,067. The rest, \$28,774, is made up of general expenditures. Public works, principally drainage,

and bridges, will require \$176,665, o which \$29,750 is a re-vote. The estimates contain a vote of \$10,000 for the establishment of

schools in new districts, including the new districts already established secure an additional \$10,000.

The Untario Plowmen's Association, which recently asked the government for a grant, receives \$250, while the Windsor and North Essex Agricultural Society is given \$210. The department of agriculture is increasing its fruitspraying demonstrations, and an extra sum of \$2,000 is being taken for that

The total estimates for the financial year 1910-1911 are \$10,987,299. This amount includes the main estimates passed last session, the supplementaries brought down earlier in the session, and those tabled yesterday. The main estimates for 1912 will be introduced towards the end of the

Another step in the direction of reforestration was taken by the government yesterday, when Hon. 3. S. Duff introduced in the legislature a bill to provide for county reforestration systems. The measure gives to county councils the right to acquire lands by lease or purchase for the purpose of planting trees, together with power to issue debentures up to \$25,000 a year to cover the amounts expended.
