## IMPOSTOR DRAWING

PENSION OF EMERY A. MILLER, OF ODESSA.

Who Served in the Civil War—Mr. Miller is Now Applying to Washington to Secure His Rights.

Emery A. Miller, Odessa, was at United States Consul Johnson's office, to-day, to ask aid in securing a pension from the United States government. He is a Canadian but fought in the civil war, being one of the 50,000 Canadians who helped the northern states to conquer the south.

Mr. Miller is over seventy years of age and is only applying for a pension because he is getting feeble and unable to work longer. "So long as I am able to keep myself, I would not apply," he said to a Whig representative.

Recently Mr. Miller made application to Washington and was examined by a pension representative who declared that he had never served in the war. The decision of this government official amuses Mr. Miller, who is now sending to his step-son to secure his discharge papers, and show the wise man from Washington that he is talking through his hat when he hands down such a decision.

The representative declared that a man by the name of Emery A. Miller, of the same corps of which the Odessa man claims to have been a member, has been drawing a pension for the past twenty years. Perhaps this is true, Mr. Miller said, "but if he is he is an impostor for I am the only Emery A. Miller who served in that company."

Mr. Miller says he joined Company I, of the 4th Massachusetts cavalry, at Grand Rapids, Mich., and was mustered out at the same place. He was in the battles of Atlanta and Noonday Church, in Georgia, and served two and a half years.

Consul Johnson has forwarded Mr. Miller's protest of the pension agent's decision to Washington. Mr. Miller will have his discharge papers looked up and these will settle the matter. Mr. Miller's descriptions show that he must have taken part in the war in the sixties.
