## GAME CLEARED \$100

**JAMES T. SUTHERLAND HANDS OVER THE MONEY**

To the Hotel Dieu and the General Hospital—Frontenacs Have Been the Means of Raising \$230 for Toronto and Kingston Hospitals.

The hockey match last evening between Frontenacs and the All-Star team of Western Ontario, realized \$100. The total receipts were over \$300, but the expenses of the visiting team and other incidentals had to be paid. This afternoon, James T. Sutherland, manager of the Frontenacs, sent cheques for fifty dollars each to the general hospital and Hotel Dieu. The Frontenacs during the past week have thus been the means of contributing \$230 to Toronto and Kingston hospitals. It was the idea of Mr. Sutherland to play in Toronto for the benefit of J. Ross Robertson's Hospital for Sick Children.

The Toronto papers said, yesterday, that the changes in the All-Star team would strengthen it. Hence the victory of the Frontenacs is all the more pronounced.

## UNDER THE CITY DOME

FINANCE COMMITTEE CONSIDER ENGINEER'S PLANS.

For New Span in Cataract Bridge—The Year's Needs May Require an Increase in Taxation.

The civic finance committee has been called to meet this afternoon at four o'clock to pass upon the plans and specifications of the city engineer with regard to the proposed eighty-foot span in the centre of Cataract bridge. The committee is having everything prepared in anticipation of the by-law being carried by the people on April 4th. It is desired that the work on the span should be started as early in April as possible. The finance committee will give the engineer instructions to call for tenders at once. It is desirable that the span should be completed by Aug. 1st.

### Garbage Inspection.

Ald. Toys will call another meeting of the special committee on garbage to consider the question of inspection. Whether the committee will agree with the recommendation of the board of health for the appointment of Market Clerk McCammon is a question. So long as Mr. McCammon has time to attend to the inspection work all will be well but the claim is made that this official, who has already a good share of civic duties, may not be able to devote the necessary time to the matter.

### Will Taxation be Increased?

The finance committee has yet to tackle the budget, which is being prepared by the city treasurer. So long as there is plenty of money it is an easy thing to make appropriations to committees, but when did the city council ever have enough money to finance the needs of the city? The first thing to be considered will be the question of an increase in the rate of taxation. Some of the aldermen do not see how they can take over things with the present rate of twenty and one-half mills. It looks as if another mill would have to be added. The additional money required for schools will be at least half a mill.

One of the Early Graduates of Queen's Medical College.

Dr. Roderick Kennedy, a resident of Bath, passed away at the general hospital, on Wednesday evening, after quite a lengthy illness. He was eighty-eight years of age and was an old resident of Bath. The remains were taken to Bath. Dr. Kennedy was one of the early students of Queen's Medical College, graduating in 1863. He was a student comrade of Hon. Dr. Sullivan. He had lived a retired life for some years.

### You Weather Man.

## ABERNETHY'S

## THEY HAD TO MOVE

CARTERS MUST KEEP ON PROPER STANDS.

Will Not be Allowed to Stay in Front of City Hall on Ontario Street—They Do Not Like the Change.

The city carters are up in arms, and all on account of the fact that Mayor Graham has ordered that the by-law be carried out in regard to the cart stands. The men have been allowed to stand on Ontario street, in front of the city hall, but this is not in accordance with the by-law. The by-law says that the carts must stand on Queen street, between Ontario street and the coal sheds, and on Ontario street, between Johnson and William street.

Mayor Graham wants to have the by-law carried out, believing that it is not good policy to have the carts out in front of the city hall, and he accordingly gave Chief Baillie instructions to "move on" the carters. The carters were given their warning ticket on Wednesday afternoon, and they are not at all pleased, as a result.

At the meeting of the board of health, on Tuesday afternoon, Mayor Graham made the remark that there were dozens of by-laws in the city which were being violated, and this is evidently his first step to put some of them right.

The by-law regarding the cart stands reads as follows:  
No. 1—On part of the east side of Ontario street, between Johnson and William street, and extending from a post erected about forty feet from the south-west corner of Ontario and Johnson streets, and thence along the east side of Ontario street to William street.

No. 2—On that part of the south side of Queen street, between Ontario street and the coal sheds.  
This morning the old stand was cleared of carts, and it was a marked improvement on the appearance of the street. The carters liked the old stand because they were near to the train.

### Two Expatriated Americans.
