WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or who is over 15 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section in each of six years.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts.

INSPECTOR NURSEY GAVE AN ADDRESS.

Larger Library Likely to be Secured in the Near Future—Should Money be Taken From Andrew Carnegie?

At the public library, on Wednesday night, Inspector Nursey gave a most interesting address, dealing with the work which is being carried on by the different libraries in Ontario.

In his opening remarks, Dr. Ross extended a warm welcome to all to visit the library in its new quarters. He pointed out that about a year and a half ago the local library had about 170 members.

city, but as yet it was not known as to what steps would be taken along this line. For the present library praise was due to the ladies who had worked very hard to put the library on a good basis.

Inspector Nursey, who paid a visit to Kingston, when the library was in its old quarters, took occasion to congratulate the members on their advancement, and paid a warm tribute to the work of the ladies. It was a wise move, he said, to put the ladies on the board of trustees, as they were such able workers. The speaker also paid tribute to the secretary, Mrs. Kennedy, for the very able manner, in which she has carried out her duties.

Inspector Nursey then went into work being carried on in his department, and gave some valuable information to the library workers. He referred to the fact that there were 114 libraries established in Ontario, large and small, all doing good work. Of this number 230 were association libraries, that is, libraries which were not free, but kept up by subscriptions, and a government grant. There were sixty-eight which had been erected, with money granted by Andrew Carnegie. The latter had given to the extent of about \$1,500,000. No matter what the opinion of a great many might be, regarding the acceptance of money, from Mr. Carnegie, it must be admitted that he had shown great generosity, in giving such a large sum for the work. The speaker was not advocating a Carnegie library for Kingston; he felt sure that it would only be a matter of a very short time, when Kingston would have a larger library. There was a time when a library was looked upon as a source of cheap affair, but it was now regarded as a great educational factor, second to the Schools.

The speaker referred to the "traveling libraries," and the good they were doing. Technical libraries were also being introduced, and as a result, workmen were deriving a great benefit from them. Before money was sent to the large sums paid out to correspondence schools in the States. The speaker advocated such a course of instruction by correspondence.

At the close of Inspector Nursey's address, on motion of D. M. McIntyre and W. S. Ellis, a vote of thanks was tendered to the speaker of the evening.

Mr. McIntyre said that while the present library was a good one, and a marked improvement over the old one, he felt that Kingston should have a larger library, one in keeping with such an important educational centre as Kingston. The speaker complimented the ladies who worked so hard to make the library such a success.

Mr. Ellis felt that the city should take advantage of the offer of Andrew Carnegie. He expressed the hope that the city would soon be able to entertain an offer from Mr. Carnegie.

Dr. Ross said that the Kingston library had made application for the technical books referred to by the inspector.
