THE SPORT REVIEW

SUPERIORITY OF TEAM OVER INDIVIDUAL PLAY

Demonstrated in the Frontenac-All-Star Hockey Game—A. T. Hatch, Manager of the Collegiate Teams.

The Toronto News says: The superiority of the team over the individual in hockey, was never more clearly demonstrated than in Kingston, Wednesday night, according to a Toronto man at the game, who says "Individually, the seven players who composed the all-stars were perhaps the equal of their conquerors, as a team they were outclassed. The smoothness with which the Frontenacs worked depicted the machine-like way of going of the University of Toronto's great rugby fourteen. Likewise the junior champions were in full possession of the finer points of the game which they played, and used their knowledge of inside hockey to grand advantage. Summing it up, they have attained perfection in team-work this coupled with their other merits, would make it an extremely hard task for any team, whether senior or junior, amateur or professional, playing a clean brand of hockey to defeat them on Kingston ice."

Trouble for Amateurs.

A number of amateur hockey players who participated in a hockey match in Brockville a week ago are quaking in their shoes as a result of an action which is taking place. It seems that the boys played with professionalists against professionals and the matter has been brought to the attention of the Canadian athletic association. If they win the Jubilee cup, Saturday night, it will be to commemorate that also, but whether they are successful in winning that or not they will hold the banquet just the same.

The interest in sport is centring itself around baseball now. The fans no sooner drop one line of sport than they take up another. Baseball is the order of the day. A meeting of the City Baseball League will be held, Monday evening for the purpose of getting things in shape for the coming season. The election of officers will be the principal item on the agenda, although there are several other important matters to be taken up.

A. T. Hatch, B.A., the popular teacher of manual training at the Collegiate Institute, has been connected with the school for the past seven years and during that time he has endeavored himself to all the boys for the reason that he is always one of them. He has taken a great interest in sport connected with the school, and has

done all in his power to assist the boys. While E. O. Sliter was manager of the hockey teams, Mr. Hatch was a great help in looking after the boys, and upon Mr. Sliter being made principal he took over the management of the teams.

All Kinds of Sports.

Philadelphia cricketers have arranged thirteen matches in England. Chicago's chances for the National baseball league pennant will drop about four notches if Orvis Overall stays in California.

The Toronto baseball players will start hard work in Macon on Monday next. There will be a special car for the Toronto club contingent. Broadbent and Davidson of the Ottawa Cliffside played under assumed names at Brockville, and will be disqualified by the interprovincial union.

It cost the New York Yankees \$7,000 to regain the services of Catcher Blair, whom George Stallings sold to the Rochester Eastern league baseball club for \$2,200.

It is said that Pitcher Babe Adams of the Pittsburgh Pirates is showing greater part of last season. The Oxford university lacrosse team which defeated Cambridge in their annual game by 3 to 3 has seven Canadians, three Englishmen and two Americans on it.

The St. Mary's hockey club, of Calgary, champions of nowhere, have declined to play for the Allan cup, though the trustees accepted a challenge from them. One of their players is ill, and another has turned pro.

Toronto Globe-Sunday amateur baseball will continue in New York state in spite of the failure to realize it. Local sentiment has supported it throughout the state, and the situation will be unaffected by the negative action of the legislature.

In the professional hockey tournament billed for New York City, the Renfrew and the Wanderers play on Friday and Saturday night and the winners meet Ottawa on Monday and Tuesday. Ottawa and the Wanderers then journey to Boston for a series. Thousand dollar purses are offered.

The civic finance committee met, yesterday afternoon, and examined the plans and specifications for the eighty-foot span to be put in Catarqui bridge, if the ratepayers pass the debenture by-law on April 4th.

Tenders are to be called for the work of construction at once, as the committee anticipates the passing of the by-law. Members of the Ontario Exploration Syndicate do not like the delay by the city in proceeding with the work, but the city council can take no other course than it is taking. The question of purchasing the bridge and improving it must be voted upon by the people. The Ontario statutes requires this. Work on the syndicate's pier is proceeding.

Made Good Job of It.

The Chatham fire engine, which was used by Chief Armstrong and his men to pump the water out of the sloop Granger, near Swift's wharf, Thursday afternoon, made a good job of it. The water was pumped out in good time, and the engine was thus the means of preventing a marine disaster right in the harbor. The owner of the vessel luckily paid a visit to the vessel in the nick of time, as had it been allowed to go on, the vessel would have gone down.
