**DISEASE AMONG BEES.**

**Bacillus Similar to That of the Bubonic Plague.**

London, March 18.—It is announced that a mysterious disease among bees, which has ruined thousands of apiaries on the continent and in England since 1904, and which has been especially virulent in this country within the last few months, may prove to be a form of the bubonic plague, which has wrought such devastation among human beings.

Dr. Walden, one of the investigators of the board of trade, asserts that he has discovered that the bacillus taken from dead bees is similar to that of the bubonic plague, but that efforts to cultivate have thus far failed.
