EDITORIAL NOTES.

There is still a wild waving of the flag. Is it to be understood that the colours of our nation are in the special-keeping of the men who oppose reciprocity? If so, dear help the flag.

Have you read the closing lines of Sir James Whitney's speech against reciprocity? The oration, eh? Nothing quite so laboured and ridiculous has been put into print in many a day.

Canada's naval scheme is a baby affair compared with Australia's. The nations that have been going mad on naval enterprise will be staggered when the seeming extravagance of some of the British colonies.

The opposition is said to be figuring on an election with reciprocity as the piece de resistance. How would they fare? The government majority is large now. It would be larger if the people had to vote on the question to-morrow.

Allan Studholme, the only labour member in the legislature, votes against reciprocity and state-aided emigration in the interest of the farmer. He is bound to hit the farmer in any way, and no one can imagine why he should.

Sir Charles Bessford is as destructive with his criticism as he is used to be with his guns. Is the training of the navy in that direction, and in that direction only? Is the military man, in times of peace, incapable of a constructive policy?

The noise some members of the commons are making with regard to the Farmers' Bank is intended as a diversion only. Anything to draw attention from reciprocity. The county member will have to face the issue squarely. Is he in favour of reciprocity or is he not?

Australia is going some in the navy question. An expenditure of \$22,500,000 a year for twenty-two years represents a total outlay of enormous proportions. Will the imperial party in Canada endorse for this young nation a programme quite so extravagant?

Meyers, a leading agriculturist of Belleville, sums up the reciprocity proposals succinctly in the following paragraph: "As a farmer, dairyman and fruitgrower, I believe the trade agreement would be of great benefit to the farmers of Eastern Ontario. As a direct descendant of the first United Empire Loyalist to settle in the Belleville district, I do not think that our prosperity could ever interfere with our adherence to the British Empire. The more and freer markets we have the better for all agriculturists."

THE SUDDEN DEMISE OF JOHN HAIG.

Sacred Concert in St. John's Church.—Danger of the Gananoque Public Library Being Closed.

Gananoque, March 20.—John Haig, for many years an employee of the Ontario Wheel Co., passed away suddenly on Saturday evening, aged eighty-eight years.

A sacred concert was rendered in St. John's church last evening in honor of Ireland's patron saint, Rev. Father O'Connell, of Trevelyan, gave an interesting lecture on Ireland. The Citizens' band furnished several musical numbers and the choir assisted.

DESIGNED COAT-OF-ARMS.

For Principal-Elect Dyde's Alberta College.

Prof. J. M. Lanos, of the Royal Military College, has designed for Prof. S. W. Dyde, the principal-elect of the new Presbyterian college at Strathcona, Alta., a coat-of-arms for that western educational institution. Prof. Lanos is a clever and skilful crest designer, the crests of the Kingston hospital and the Frontenac Club being from his hand and pen. The one for Prof. Dyde's college is emblazoned upon that of the province of Alberta, which is made up of a red cross at the top, the Rocky mountains underneath, then the green hills, the plains, islands and river, and the wheat fields at the bottom. Prof. Lanos has placed the burning bush, the emblem of the Presbyterian church, in the centre of the wheat fields, its light reaching to the top of the mountains, showing the power of the church and college in Western Canada. On top of the crest are seven candlesticks, and the open Bible.
