PRIZES PRESENTED AT A MEETING OF THE CURLING CLUB.

Members Made a Fine Showing in the Different Competitions—Review of the Games Played During the Season.

There was a largely-attended meeting of the Kingston Curling Club, on Thursday night, at the rink, when the presentation of prizes took place, and other business was transacted. In the absence of R. J. McKelvey, the president, who, much to the regret of all the members of the club, was unable to be present, owing to illness, the chair was taken by E. O. Slater. The secretary, T. M. Asseltine, gave the club an interesting review of the work of the season, and other matters. It was pointed out that of the large number of games arranged, there were only five which were not played, but these did not interfere with the standing, for the winners of the different competitions.

The Kingston club sent to outside places, twenty teams, and entertained, by curling and club privileges, thirty-five teams from clubs at Prescott, Brockville, Napanee, Cobourg, Colborne, Port Hope and Rockwood. The senior curlers made the best showing in years, tying with Napanee for the senior championship of the Central Ontario Curling League. The team lost on the play-off, after putting up a great fight. The juniors brought both honor and glory to the local club, winning all their games with a majority of sixty-six points to the good, and capturing the handsome trophy, presented by the league. For the Rockwood trophy, the Kingston club won three games and lost one, having a majority of fourteen points on the four games played. The local club will take possession of the trophy until Rockwood curlers succeed in winning it.

In the points competition, for the Ontario Curling Association, Prof. Dyde made a score of forty-eight, and it is hoped that his score will stand high, and that he will secure the handsome silver medal offered in this competition. This medal is played for by all the clubs affiliated with the parent body. The scores made by the Kingston curlers, in this event, were particularly high. Prof. Laird came second, with a score of forty-two, and J. M. Elliott scored thirty-five. Messrs. T. M. Asseltine, A. W. McLean, T. Slater and A. Turcott scored thirty-four; W. B. Dalton, thirty-two, and E. H. Brower, thirty-one; and Messrs. W. H. Montgomery, Dr. Ross and Rev. H. T. Wallace, thirty. There were thirteen remarkable showings in capturing both the trophies, something which has been done only twice before. The club members take off their hats to Mr. Warwick every time.

The cup won by the juniors in the Central Ontario league series was presented to T. M. Asseltine, who will have the pleasure of keeping this trophy in custody until some other team wins it from his teammates. The Ogilvie shield for the points competition, was presented to Rev. Robert Laird, who made an aggregate of seventy-six points, eighteen points better than his score last year, and on which he won the same trophy. In this competition the club members also made a very fine showing. Messrs. Slater, Spaulding, Asseltine, Brower, Ross, George Cannon, A. Turcott and A. W. McLean were well up in the running.

After the business had been disposed of, Mr. Slater made a short address in which he paid a warm tribute to the work of the genial secretary, T. M. Asseltine, whose untiring efforts have been the means of putting the club on such a strong basis. Mr. Asseltine, he said, had been a hard worker for the interests of the club and every member appreciated very much his worth. He had given freely of his time to promote the club's affairs and at the bonapols held had shown wonderful executive ability. Every member of the club held up both hands for the resolution of thanks tendered to the secretary. Votes of thanks were also tendered to S. R. Bailey, who had charge of the ice, to the treasurer, E. Lyons, and to the local papers for their reports of the meetings, games, etc.

The members also passed a resolution expressing regret at the illness of the president, R. J. McKelvey, who had at all times, been very active in promoting the interests of the club. The wish was expressed that he would soon be able to be out again. There is still good ice at the curling rink and games can be played any afternoon. The ice cannot be used at night as the lights have been turned off.
