AN ILL-TIMED ATTACK. The Earl of Grey is finding many friends in Canada who defend him from the charge of impropriety in promoting imperial union in every way he can.

He is active in good works, and wherever he can he exalts the imperia question, with the concurrence of every true Canadian. The attitude of Mr. Bottrass towards the governor-general has been a puzzle unto many. He has complained that Earl Grey has biased himself as an imperial agent, and no one else except Mr. Ewart can so where he has done any wrong.

The noble earl, and under circumstances which cannot be justified it is not many to attack the only person in all the land who cannot rustle into the newspapers to defend himself.

And after all is there anything in the service of the governor-general which is not to be found in the leaders of the Canadian parties. Canada favours the imperial idea. The Laurier government passed the imperia preference and promises to extend it.

The same government sent troops to South Africa to defend imperial interests there. The Canadian navy will be at the disposal of the mother country should it be wanted. The loyal opposition would go one step further and provide a large grant of money for defence purposes immediately. Canada owes much to the mother country, for past favours, and is entitled to show its love and loyalty now.

Mr. Ewart made a mistake when he attacked the governor-general. He will live to repent of his action.

A WOMAN'S WORK AGAIN.

Dr. Helin MacMurphy, of Toronto, suffers in forcefulness of character because she is a woman. It is assumed by some that she would have been subject to less criticism as a public school examiner, or medical inspector, had she been a man. She made this medical inspection necessary by her persistent and intelligent agitation, and because she had her own ideas about the manner in which she should perform her duty she was reproached. She gained in one respect. She was not removed from office, because she has an influential following.

Dr. MacMurphy is coming to her own in another respect. She has been the faithful student of social conditions, and has, by letters, articles and addresses, demonstrated the necessity of providing for the imbeciles of the province. Without protection the lot of certain unfortunate women is made infinitely worse, and Ontario is burdened, in many ways, with a rapid increase in the number of its incompetents, mentally. How the lesson has been impressed upon the government by pitiful instances of woman's fall and misfortune! But up to the present the campaign has been without any result, or any assurance of result, and the evidence has been accumulating of the duty of the government.

The meeting in the parliament building, Toronto, just before the legislature prorogued, at which the Hon. Mr. Hanna heard from a deputation on the subject, affords the first glimmer of hope to the friends of the imbeciles. The provincial secretary listened thoughtfully to the pleas of many persons, representing many interests and societies, and confessed that his disposition was to apologize that something had not been done for the weak minded. It is an encouraging sign when the head of a responsible department expresses his sympathy and regret. It is only a step further towards the beginning of a new movement, which means a check upon imbecility. Dr. MacMurphy is to be congratulated. She at last sees the travail of her soul and ought to be satisfied.

THE BLACK MAN'S LIFE.

The attack upon Dr. Booker T. Washington, in a recent house, New York, a few nights ago, has been variously regarded. An American paper, the Waterbury Times, thinks that too much fuss has been made over the case. The head of the Tuskegee Institute was in the great city on business, and had a letter from his treasurer to call upon a friend. He left

the letter in a coat at his hotel, and, getting into the neighborhood in which this friend was alleged to live, started to look him up.

He stepped into the lobby of the tenement house referred to and commenced to study the numbers over the doors. While thus innocently occupied one Ulrich came into the hall and pounded him over the head with a club. The wonder is that Washington was not killed. He was gathered up and carried to an hospital, where he was identified, many stitches put into the scalp, and his wounds bound up. The Times says that being a negro, and engaged in spying, the janitor of the building went out with a club, and, just as it was natural for a janitor to do, hit him on the head.

It turns out that Ulrich was unduly suspicious, that he was a deserter from his family, and that the woman who egged on the murderous assailant, who not his wife. Public opinion and public feeling have run with the coloured man. President Taft expressed his interest and friendship. The principal of the best trade school in the United States has had many reminders of the contempt the white trash has for his race. He has been shown many indignities, and he has accepted them in a gentle but by no means humiliating spirit.

He is a black, a typical southerner, with an intellect that has made him a leader in education, with a character that is among the best, with a tongue that has not been excelled in dispassionate by that of the great Frederick Douglass. The Times adds that out for the man no attention would have been paid to the incident. Which may be true. The average African is shown very little courtesy in the United States. Any one except Washington might have been assaulted, even killed, and the busy world would have heard nothing about it. Such is the value attached to a black man's life!

DOGGING THE ISSUE.

The government, has, for the present, escaped from the embarrassment which a supporter threatened in the discussion of bi-lingual schools. Mr. Ferguson, whom the premier counts as one of his party, gave notice of a motion which meant that English should be the language of instruction and communication in this province. This meant, if literally interpreted, and as Mr. Ferguson intended, that there would not be bi-lingual schools, as they have existed in some places in Ontario.

If the Bishop Fallon interview with the provincial secretary had not taken place, and if the Hanna record of it had not been printed, the situation would not be as it is to-day. But the bishop saw the necessity of elucidating the subject, from his standpoint, in an epistle that for clearness and conciseness of statement has not been surpassed by any public document in many moons, and the controversy became intense. The publicity given to a question on which there was bound to be a division of opinion, led to an investigation by several independent authorities.

The journalists, with that enterprise which is their stock in trade, the alertness and energy that are characteristic of them, made pilgrimages over the districts which contained the bi-lingual schools, and gave the results of their observations. The government sent out inspectors who found conditions pretty much as they had been described. Meanwhile the Hon. Dr. Pyne, who glories in the fact that he is an "Orange minister of education," is depending on a special report from Dr. Merchant. The inspector is not in any hurry with this work. He could have reported long since but that would not have been expedient. So the schools are to be English unless the department sees the necessity for English and French under very special circumstances. And Mr. Ferguson is satisfied.

Will all the others interested accept the announcement in a calm and kindly spirit? It remains to be seen. The outburst of feeling was regarded as more than a tempest in a teapot. It began with Bishop Fallon's candid statement that bi-lingual schools were a pronounced failure, that a school had to be either French or English, and that the attempt to make them anything else would be a failure. The report of an inspector will not change the situation. Something radical is expected, and it must take place.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Of course Manitoba is not satisfied on the boundary award question. No one expected that its government would agree to anything. What would it do for an election card if deprived of this?

Mr. Studholme did not succeed in getting his bills regarding the eight-hour day and the woman's franchise, through the local house. Cannot do much with a party of one, and that one of a very wobbly kind.

Geo. French must have used his eyes and seen a lot when he toured through Canada as the inspector-general. Many changes have been made since he spoke, and the end has not been reached. A man of the French variety seems to be of more use than

a dozen military councils of the Ottawa kind.

Kingston streets are the dirtiest in Ontario. The snow became slush, at this season of the year, but here it mixes with the mud which is not to be found in the cities that are paved.

The Anti-Reciprocity League, in Montreal, supplied the fireworks which were used on the occasion of Mr. Sifton's visit. The cost! Damn it, hasn't the protective tariff made these fellows rich?

Just what we expected. The Sifton incident in Montreal, so far as the McGill students are concerned, is the result of a misunderstanding. The attack was conducted by those who thought the students were being used for political purposes.

Stratford, St. Thomas, London, Guelph, are being brilliantly illuminated with electricity. The Tungsten lamps are used, at close range, and the effect is very fine. Provided the cost is not excessive the western cities are certainly well lighted.

What is the matter with the Galt Reporter? It says that reciprocity means that American furniture will be dumped into Canada and the Canadian furniture factories killed. And the tariff unchanged. In the absence of the editor, the printers' devil must have assumed control with the usual result.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

Simultaneous peace meetings to be held in London and New York. The indications are that navigation will be late in opening owing to weather conditions. Endeavors are being made to have the Chateau Laurier at Ottawa opened on September 1st.

A Scotch wife crossed the ocean and had her husband arrested in Toronto on a charge of bigamy. In the Brentford, Eng., bye-election J. J. O'Sullivan, the unionist candidate, was returned unopposed.

The dominion government gives assurance there will be no discrimination against negro immigrants. Guided by fumes the detectives found opium den and two thousand dollars worth of the drug in Toronto.

Sixteen thousand barrels of whiskey valued at \$2,000,000 were burned in a bond house at Bloomsburg, Pa. The strike against the Adams Express Co., which directly affected Wells-Fargo & Co. and the United States Express Co., has been declared off.

Dr. William Iglis Bradley, one of Ottawa's best known physicians, is dead at Montreal. He graduated from Toronto university in 1884 and from McGill in 1888.

Dr. J. A. Carmichael, Winnipeg, was recommended to be appointed as associate secretary with Dr. McLaren, at a session of the Home Missionary committee of the Presbyterian church.

The Example Galt Gives. Ottawa Free Press. Galt has decided to spend \$12,000 in the purchase of a farm to be devoted to sites for new factories. The farm is costing them \$100 an acre.

In doing this Galt is showing an example for progressiveness and business. Galt isn't a very big place, less than 10,000 population, but Galt is ambitious and the place is filled with solid thinking business men.

Galt plans to fill a 120 acre farm with factories. If that can be done it means much more population for Galt, and it means more money for those same business men.

They are not giving this farm away to new industries. Not much, they are too Scotch in Galt for that, but they are marking the land down to bargain prices.

Ottawa can take a leaf out of little Galt's book. An idea along the same lines is being urged here. If Galt, which has hardly emerged from the village row stage, can take such a step, why can't Ottawa? Such schemes are taking root in this city, which is a most encouraging sign.

Guelp Mercury. The conservatives can now add yet another name to the list of "traitors to the empire," as they designate those who express themselves as being in favor of the reciprocity pact. Hon. A. J. Balfour, leader of the opposition in the British parliament, endorses the principle of arbitration between Great Britain and the United States as being calculated to bring the two nations into more friendly relations. Of course the logical sequence is that the United States will now annex the whole British empire.
