POSITION OF CITY IN REGARD TO CATARAQUI BRIDGE BY-LAW.

It Will be Withdrawn Only When the Ontario Exploration Syndicate Refuses to Sign It.

The city council is in an uncertain position with regard to the by-law for the purchase of Cataraqui bridge and the building of a span. The by-law is the result of an agreement with the Exploration syndicate. Until the latter refuses positively to sign the new agreement the by-law cannot very well be withdrawn. The syndicate's letter to the mayor was a lengthy statement of the situation, but it did not state positively that its dealings with the city were off, although it intimated that it would be obliged to seek another shipping point, and gave the civic representatives some vague blows. City Solicitor McIntyre has read over the syndicate's letter and he has advised Mayor Graham to withhold the third publication of the by-law until the very last minute. If the syndicate does not sign the agreement in another week then he advises the council to withdraw the by-law from the vote of the people.

In some quarters criticisms are heard concerning the action of the city solicitor in advising the mayor not to sign the first agreement passed by the city council, providing for a sixty-foot span in the bridge. Had the mayor signed the agreement would have been binding between the city and the syndicate, the money would have been paid over, and the latter would have been settled here. It is pointed out in defence of the solicitor that it was his duty to protect the city and not allow the mayor of the council to do anything illegal. It would have been illegal to have spent money on the bridge without the consent of the ratepayers, which would have been got by their vote on a by-law. When the agreement with the company was first before the council the solicitor informed it that the law would not allow it to expend money on the bridge for its improvement without the consent of the people, but the council decided to pass the agreement and trust to the people for their sanction afterwards. The proposition for an eighty-foot span settled the matter.

There is no doubt but that the bridge question will be submitted to the people later on. A new by-law will have to be passed, however, eliminating the Exploration company as a party. Lieut.-Col. Crowe, commandant of the Military College, has written Mayor Graham asking if, in the event of the bridge being improved, it is the intention of the council to provide a temporary crossing for vehicles. If not, Col. Crowe says that it will be of great inconvenience to the Military College residents. City Engineer Craig was asked this morning what the intention was in regard to the matter and he replied that no provision for vehicles had been considered so far. There would be a temporary crossing provided for foot passengers.

WERE AMERICANS EXECUTED? Washington Asks Mexico Regarding Report of Shooting.

Washington, March 21.—The state department has asked the United States consul at Chihuahua for information in regard to the press reports that John Hamilton Dignowity and three other Americans, have been shot to death under orders of a Mexican drumhead court-martial, which found them guilty of participation in the insurrection movement.

No Local Option. St. Thomas, Ont., March 21.—The local option by-law in West Lorne was lost when Judge Colter delivered judgment in the case by striking off five votes, it was shown by evidence that five tenants voted who had, by moving out of the municipality, no right to vote. Taking the five votes improperly cast from the voted polled in favor of the by-law left only 137 votes, which is three-fifths of a vote less than the statutory requirements to carry the by-law.

Killed With Coal Shovel. Boston, March 21.—A coal shovel used as a club in the hand of another woman is alleged by the police to have been the cause of injuries from which Bridget Moore, aged sixty, and unmarried, died last night, at the city hospital. There were a dozen cuts and contusions on her head, Josephine Heron, at whose home in the south end, the police say, the two women quarrelled this evening, was taken into custody. She is fifty-seven years old and single.

WHERE WILL IT END? Montreal, March 24.—The action of Judge Laurendeau in backing up and annulling the marriage of two Catholics because they were married by a Protestant clergyman, has caused a lot of comment here, and Protestants are saying where will this end? There is talk of appealing to the supreme court.

The Late Mrs. Stephen Tyo. The death occurred, on Thursday night, of Ann Tvoey, widow of the late Capt. Stephen Tyo, at her home, 14 Rodan street, of general debility, aged sixty-eight years. Deceased is survived by two sons and five daughters: Alexander and Stephen, of this city; Mrs. W. H. Pipe, Syracuse, N.Y.; Mrs. Charles Hamilton, Boston; Mrs. Valentine Nixon, New York; Mrs. John Anderson and Mrs. George Cornelius, Kingston. The funeral will take place on Monday morning, at St. Mary's cathedral.

Appointed Recording Secretary. At the meeting of Limestone Lodge, A.O.U.W., last evening, William Godwin, Jr., was appointed as recording secretary for the remainder of the year, to take the place of his father, the late William H. Godwin. Several touching tributes were paid deceased for his faithful and unflinching work on behalf of the lodge during his term of office and an expression of sorrow at his death was ordered to be sent to the bereaved family.

No New Elevators. Winnipeg, Man., March 24.—A change of policy with regard to the elevator system of the province has been determined on by the Manitoba government. That the government did not intend to build or buy any more elevators other than those which are now under way was the announcement made by the provincial treasurer at the conclusion of the discussion on the supplementary estimates in the legislature.

A Narrow Escape. Aylmer, Ont., March 24.—William Orton, a young man employed by the Aylmer Pump Co., had a narrow escape from death or serious injury. While oiling a shaft his coat became caught, throwing him from his feet. The clothes were all stripped from his body, and he was badly bruised and cut, but no bones are broken.

PEACE AGENT KILLED AND BODY SHIPPED BACK IN A BOX.

The Alleged Deed of Insurrectos in Mexico—General Luque Was the Victim—Sent by Diaz.

Denver, Col., March 24.—Mutilated and nails driven into the skull, the body of Gen. Luque, a member of the personal staff of President Diaz, has been shipped in a packing box to Mexico by insurrectos, to whom Gen. Luque had been sent by Diaz as a peace agent, according to a letter from a former Denver man now residing in Mexico. According to the letter, Gen. Luque, in whom Diaz had the greatest confidence, was sent from Mexico City to Chihuahua, in December, to investigate the condition of the insurrection in the north and attempt to pacify the rebels.

TO HAVE BYE-ELECTIONS. Likely Brodeur and Beland Will be Transferred.

Ottawa, March 24.—Orders were issued, yesterday, by the clerk of the crown in chancery to the government printing bureau to get the voters' lists for Rouville and Beauce ready at once. This means that Hon. L. P. Brodeur, who is the member for Rouville, is going to the supreme court bench in succession to the late Justice Girouard and that his successor in the department of marine and fisheries will be Dr. H. S. Beland, Beauce. It had been thought that Mr. Lemieux would take over the marine department but evidently this is not so.

New Grand Trunk Station. Cobourg, March 24.—Specifications, it is learned, are being prepared for a Grand Trunk station at the ferry dock here. A ticket office, waiting room and baggage-room, it is said, will constitute the building. It is expected that the station will be ready at the time the Ontario goes on her summer schedule.

It is also stated that a second ferry boat will be soon built, in all probability for the Rochester-Cobourg route, the Ontario having proved a paying proposition.

Ends Life by Hanging. Rochester, N.Y., March 24.—Rev. Richard A. Leuz, pastor of the Universalist church at Nunda, committed suicide by hanging himself with a trunk strap in his woodshed. His act is attributed to mental trouble brought on by over study. Mr. Leuz was a graduate of St. Lawrence university and was formerly located at Potters, Pa. He is survived by his widow.

Was in Hard Luck. An elderly man, who was released from the jail to-day, after serving a term of fifteen days, for assaulting a county constable, found himself in hard luck. He had no money with which to purchase a ticket to his home on the Kingston and Pembroke railway and a couple of Kingstonsians paid his way.

Powder Companies Merge. Montreal, March 21.—Official confirmation was given, this morning, regarding the merger with four millions capital, of sundry powder and dynamite companies in Eastern Canada to control the entire output and sale.

Killed by Freight Engine. Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., March 24.—Harry Melton, C.P.R. boiler washer, was struck by a freight engine, dragged several hundred yards, and killed. He leaves a wife and three children.

USED MAILS ILLEGALLY. Millionaire Manufacturer Found Guilty of Fraud.

Cincinnati, O., March 21.—William P. Harrison, millionaire head of the Woodlawn Manufacturing company and a number of subsidiary concerns, was found guilty in the United States court of using the mails to defraud. The conviction is one of the first growing out of the recent raids made by Postmaster-General Hitchcock, in connection with the department of justice in an effort to break up fraudulent concerns. Harrison is alleged in his literature to have misrepresented a vacuum carpet cleaner, which he sold through the mails. He was convicted on seven counts in two indictments that make possible a total prison sentence of thirty-five years or fines on each count from \$1,000 to \$5,000. The case will be appealed.

WOULD WIPE OUT OPIUM TRADE. General Assembly to be Asked to Petition Britain.

Toronto, March 24.—The general assembly of the Presbyterian church is to be asked to petition the imperial government to abrogate the opium treaty with China. This was decided at a meeting of the executive of the committee on Moral and Social Reform and Evangelism, which was held, yesterday. The committee also expressed gratification at the work both of the dominion government and the Quebec legislature, prohibiting the traffic in opium, cocaine and similar drugs, except for medicinal purposes.

MAY LEAVE POST. London, March 24.—A report is current that David Lloyd George will be compelled, by ill-health, to resign from his post as chancellor of the exchequer. Authorities refuse to confirm or deny the report, saying it is totally unauthorized.

THE TERRIBLE DEATH. Of Sixteen Firemen at a Milwaukee Fire.

Milwaukee, March 24.—Sixteen firemen were precipitated into a huge furnace when the roof of the Middleton wholesale house caved in while they were fighting the flames from it. Some of them were alive when assistance reached them, and they were taken to a hospital. Several are still in the ruins, dead.

INSURANCE RATES GO UP. Over the Possible Russo-Chinese Outbreak.

London, Eng., March 24.—Following the private despatches from the far east, this afternoon, to the effect that war between China and Russia is inevitable, Lloyds increased their insurance rates against outbreak of hostilities from five to ten guineas per cent. Intense uneasiness prevails here in Russo-Chinese circles.

Walks Off With Jewels. Washington, March 24.—With diamonds and jewelry belonging to Miss Mary V. Adams, and her guest, Mrs. D. B. Merriman, amounting in value to \$10,000, secreted in her clothing, Mary Miller, a young woman who had worked for one day as a maid, last night walked from the house unnoticed and so far has eluded the police. The police are positive that Mrs. Miller is the same woman who, within the last year, has operated in Detroit, Baltimore, Rochester and several other cities in a similar manner. Her last robbery was in Rochester, where, as Mary Mueller, she secured jewels from the home of a prominent resident, amounting in value to about \$25,000.

Nearly \$500,000 Spent on Canal. Ottawa, March 24.—So far \$459,832 has been expended by the federal government upon the Newmarket canal, according to the answer given in the house, to-day, to a question by Capt. Wallace (C. York). The amount spent on the oft-mentioned waterway in 1910-11 was \$135,892 out of a vote of \$150,000. It is expected that the canal will be completed by 1913 at an estimated cost of \$1,100,000. The amount to be spent in 1911-12 will be \$195,900, with between \$30,000 and \$35,000 for cement, engineering charges and bridges.

Legislature Prorogued. Toronto, March 14.—Accompanied by usual military ceremonies, the Ontario legislature was prorogued, this afternoon. The lieutenant-governor, in the speech from the throne, referred to various measures passed during the session, and hoped for continued prosperity in the province in the future.
