ACCUSED OF ESPIONAGE.

London Ship Broker Under Arrest in Germany. Hamburg, March 24.—The Fremdenblatt says that the forger who was recently arrested with four other men on the charge of espionage has made a confession. The prisoners had been under surveillance for some weeks, as suspicions were aroused that the forger was seeking information on the warship, now under construction. Excellent plans relating to the works at Kiel were found in the forger's possession. The authorities have not as yet disclosed his identity, but they declare that he is a London ship broker and that his chief accomplice is a high official of the naval shipyard.

Effect of Petroleum on Plants.
