

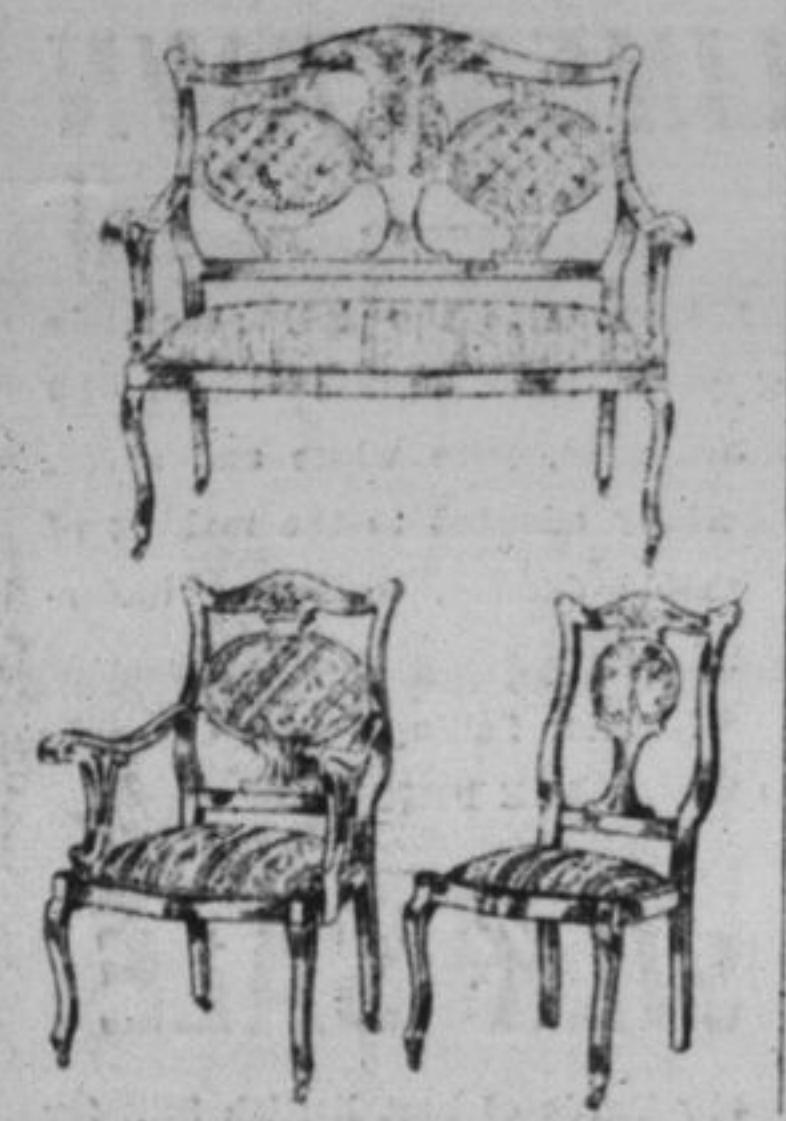

NAVIGATION VERY LATE

The Boats Will Be Delayed by Weather Conditions.

"At this rate it will be the middle of April before we have the opening of navigation," remarked a marine man to the Whig, last night.

TWENTY-TWO MILLS

TO BE KINGSTON'S TAX RATE THIS YEAR.

Mowat Memorial Hospital to Receive Civic Grant of \$2,000—Committees Will Get Larger Grants.

Kingston's tax rate this year will be twenty-two mills, an increase of one and one-half mills. The civic finance committee, of which Mayor Graham is chairman, fixed the rate at a meeting, on Friday evening, when the budget was prepared. It was agreed that the council must have more revenue for the needs of the city, unless the civic departments are to be starved. The tax increase will yield about \$15,000, and this amount is urgently needed.

The various civic committees will receive a little more than they did last year. The board of works will probably get another \$1,000. The city property committee will receive a similar increase for improvements to the city buildings, and being the intention to give this committee an extra appropriation for three years to do the necessary work. It will be impossible, this year, to instal a heating system in the north-east wing. This will probably be done in 1913. Ald. Kent's parks committee will receive \$300 more than last year.

It was decided to give a grant of \$2,000 to the Mowat Memorial Hospital for Tuberculosis. The Children's Aid Society will receive \$150. The other charitable grants will remain the same as last year.

PASSION PLAY LECTURE

In Sydenham Street Bible Hall Friday Evening.

About seven hundred take part in the play, which opens with the triumphal entry of Christ into Jerusalem and ends with the ascension on Mount Olivet. The pictures shown by Mr. Lang were beautiful and clear, and his descriptions were lucid and interesting.

A feeling of awe passed over the audience as they looked on the pictures of the suffering of Jesus, and as Mr. Lang pointed out the fact that it was this story of Jesus that had influenced the world for two thousand years.
