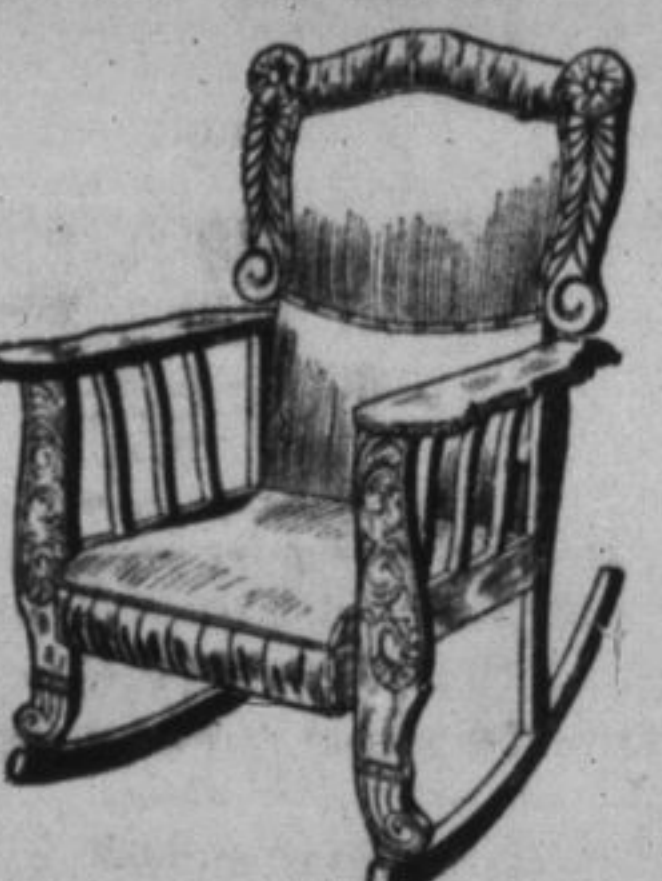

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
