THE AGREEMENT WILL PASS.

Champ Clark, the democrat, who will be speaker of the next house of representatives if he wants it, and the man who gave the conservatives of Canada the text for so many attacks on reciprocity, has been talking in New York. He reached the great city after a prolonged tour through the northern and middle states, and everywhere he discussed politics and got fat. When Mr. Clark wants a vacation he takes to campaigning, and gets heavier. So that it agrees with him.

Asked what the feeling was with regard to the tariff he said it could stand a general revision downward and he was not sure but that the work in that direction would be pretty complete when it was begun. The reciprocity agreement would be carried at the special session. That result was certain. The house might go further and, said he, "I do not believe President Taft will dare veto a tariff bill merely because it is a democratic measure."

The democratic leader admitted that he differed with some people he met with regard to the trade agreement. He thought it would be a good thing for the United States, but in Iowa he met a judge who said the only member of congress from the state who voted for reciprocity was a Mr. Hubbard, and had the vote occurred last winter he could not have been rejected.

The Iowa farmers were against reciprocity because they feared the competition of the Canadian farmers. Their argument and attitude seemed to be that the pact would be a good thing for Canada. Champ Clark said he could defend it in the states, but he did not say that he was influenced with the idea that it would lead to annexation.

A TRUCE WITH PARTIES.

A few days ago the parties in the legislature of Saskatchewan were fighting each other with a fierceness with a parallel. Obstruction had set in, and it was announced that there would be no surrender. The government would do its business somehow, and if, after a prolonged siege, this would be impossible, there would be an appeal to the people.

Then the unexpected happened. Hon. Mr. Scott, the leader of the government, collapsed. He is not a strong man physically, and he had been submitted to a heavy strain. So far as he was concerned the war was over. He was ordered off for a rest, and made preparation for a trip to the coast. The situation appealed to the sympathy of the house, and members of the government side and opposition vied with each other in giving Mr. Scott the assurance of their esteem. They agreed to end the struggle, on conditions which guaranteed their respect and honour.

Mr. Haultain, the leader of the opposition, made the announcement in the legislature and said:

"The settlement we have come to is one with no sacrifice of either side. It is a settlement which does not forfeit the respect of either side for the other."

The paper which Mr. Scott used to own and edit, the Regina Leader, puts it in another way when it says: "Just as in regard to the subject of reciprocity, and later in relation to the subject of the transfer by the dominion of all the public domain, except the agricultural lands, to the province, so on this more strictly party issue, government and opposition came together for Saskatchewan's advantage." What a pity it is that the parties at Ottawa could not show similar discretion and similar valour in their dealings with each other.

A VERY TIMELY WARNING.

The conservative press is not disposed to admit that the Montreal meeting, on Saturday evening, which Mr. Fielding, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Smith, addressed, made any impression upon the anti-reciprocity agitation. It may not have silenced the claqueurs, the men who have no reason to be hostile save that they suspect that some day there may be reciprocity in manufactures as well as natural products, and their cinch on the market will be broken.

Mr. Fielding put these men in their place when he told them they had no occasion to croak, that they were not hurt and would not be hurt, that the government of which he was a member recognized the unwisdom of free trade in the products of the workshops, and that by fighting a treaty which meant prosperity to the farmers they were

creating conditions they would sooner or later very deeply repent. A conservative paper said Mr. Fielding pleaded with the manufacturers to trust and support the government. No, he did not plead. He stated certain facts, and accompanied them with a warning, that if they brought about a war between the east and the west, they could assume the responsibility.

The meeting was educational, and it is as such had its value. This one can judge from the observation of the Montreal Gazette, an anti-reciprocity organ, which said: "The meeting was decidedly one of the most important from a point of public policy as opposed to mere party politics which has been held in Montreal for many years." It was certainly calming in its results, and must have convinced all reasonably disposed people of the folly of the Anti-Reciprocity League.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The tax rate is up. We will feel happier now.

The "Sirs" are not so vehement on the trade question as they were. Has a little anything to do with the expression of one's views?

The Sheffield choir give 110 concerts in Canada and the United States, and will travel 33,000 miles. The estimated cost of the tour is \$200,000.

President Taft's message to congress refers to the one subject—the trade agreement. That is the way the American government is shelving the question.

Mr. Foster is haunted with another fear. It is that Canada may become too national. Canada for the Canadians used to be the slogan. What would Mr. Foster have it?

This taxation of bar receipts is about the smallest act of a very small government. It is predicted that a year hence it will be repealed as a wholly impracticable thing.

Mr. Fielding does not need to advertise his loyalty. He has been in public life for thirty years, and bears a character that cannot be affected by the slanders of any ill-bred assailant.

Hon. Mr. Peck, at St. Thomas, predicted that electricity would become cheap enough to be eventually in every home. It will be some time before it is as cheap as candle power, which was the promise he made in Kingston.

No Panic Here.

Mackenzie & Mann awarded contracts for the construction and grading of 900 miles of new Canadian Northern railway in the Canadian west. The amount of money involved is eight million dollars. This does not look much as if the greatest individual railway builders in the world had any fear that reciprocity will divert trade north and south and destroy railway traffic east and west.

Hon. Clifford Sifton, high as he is as an authority, may declare, for personal, or political, or other purposes, that Canadian railways will be ruined by reciprocity. He shows his faith by his words. Mackenzie & Mann, on the contrary, show their faith by their works—by spending their good, hard money.



WILL CROWN QUEEN

DOUBLE CEREMONY TO BE PERFORMED

By Archbishop of Canterbury—His Grace of York to Preach—The King is Popular.

London, March 28.—King George has decided that the Archbishop of Canterbury shall crown the queen as well as himself next June. This is in accordance with precedent of the early times, practically the only exception being at the coronation of King Edward, when Queen Alexandra was crowned by the Archbishop of York.

There was no sermon at the coronation of King Edward, the service having been specially shortened, owing to the fact that the king had not completely recovered from a serious illness, but at the approaching coronation the sermon will be preached by the Archbishop of York.

King George is gaining in popularity daily by the determination he is showing to obtain an insight into the everyday life of his people.

Last evening the king, accompanied by the queen and Princess Mary, paid a surprise visit to the new general post office and spent two hours in investigating its immense ramifications.

The king and queen sent cordial greetings to the European capitals and witnessed with interest the replies coming over the wires.

AN EIGHT-HOUR DAY

For Women in the State of Washington.

Spokane, Wash., March 28.—Eight hours for work, eight hours for sleep and eight hours for study and recreation, is the new order of things that may be worked out in the state of Washington when the woman's labor law becomes effective, on June 9th. The new regulation, adopted by the legislature at its last session, provides that no woman or girl employed in mercantile establishment, office, laundry, hotel or restaurant shall be permitted to work more than eight hours a day. The penalty is a fine of from \$10 to \$100 for each violation. Several manufacturing plants in Spokane have already worked out plans by which the eight-hour day will go into effect early in April, thus giving employment to from fifteen to twenty per cent. more women than formerly. The laundry men are not satisfied and are preparing to make a test case. The eight-hour rule has been observed in business offices several years, but the hotels and restaurants are working on a basis of eleven and twelve hours. Three thousand women in Spokane are affected by the change.

Large Audience Hears Discussion of the Reciprocity Agreement.

Newcastle, March 28.—An anti-reciprocity meeting at Orono was addressed last week by C. J. Thornton, M.P. for Durham, Mr. Best, M.P. for Dufferin, and Mr. Goodeve, M.P. for Kootenay, B.C. In spite of the bad roads the attendance was large, showing the great interest that is felt in the matter. Mr. Best showed how the farmer, though he might gain in a small degree by reciprocity, would lose in the long run. Mr. Goodeve said that Canadian markets would be flooded by foreign products. The Canadian fruit growers would lose in consequence of this. He showed how the country had progressed under the present tariff system.

Berlin, March 28.—In connection with the launching of the battleship Kaiser, Emperor William has created Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg a major-general a la suite of the army. Prince von Radlow, who is also a civilian, was awarded this honor when he was chancellor.

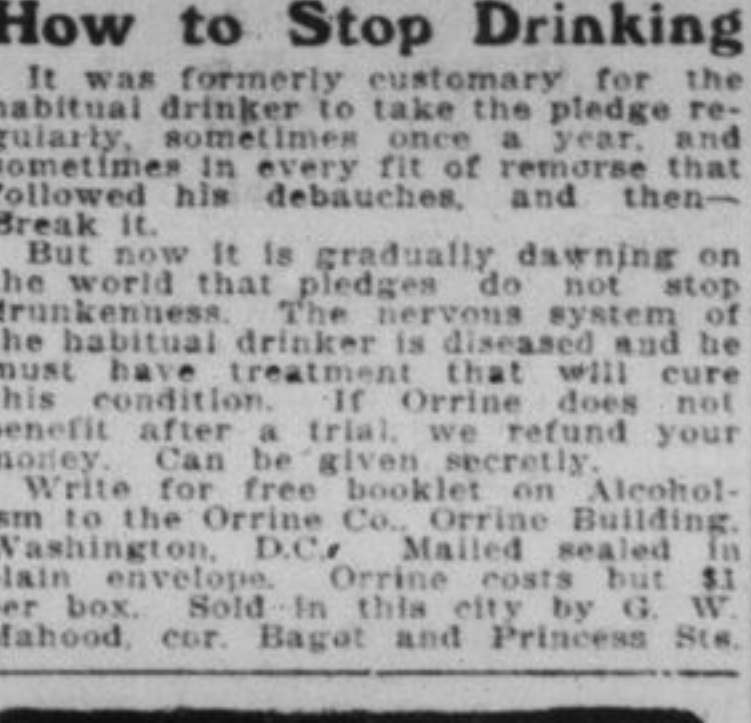
