

BRIDE LOSES HUSBAND AND LIFETIME SAVINGS.

Paterson, N.J., March 28.—Declaring that she was married only ten days ago and that her husband and \$1,100, which was all the money she possessed, is missing, Mrs. Lena Roberts has asked the police to help her find some trace of her husband, who disappeared from a hotel in this city.

The woman, who declared that she was married in Philadelphia on March 14th, to Otto H. Roberts, of Philadelphia, following a courtship which began at Sea Isle City last summer, told the police that her husband induced her to turn over all her money to him, as he intended purchasing a hotel there. She did so yesterday, and he left the hotel where they were stopping, and it was not for some hours that she finally concluded that her husband and her money had gone.

She says the money represents the savings of a lifetime and just now she is more interested in recovering the money than she is in getting back her husband. Roberts is about twenty-nine years of age.
