SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Application must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district.

Application may be made by proxy, but must be made in person at certain conditions.

By father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years.

A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres.

Occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead.

Price, \$1.00 per acre. Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years.

Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.
