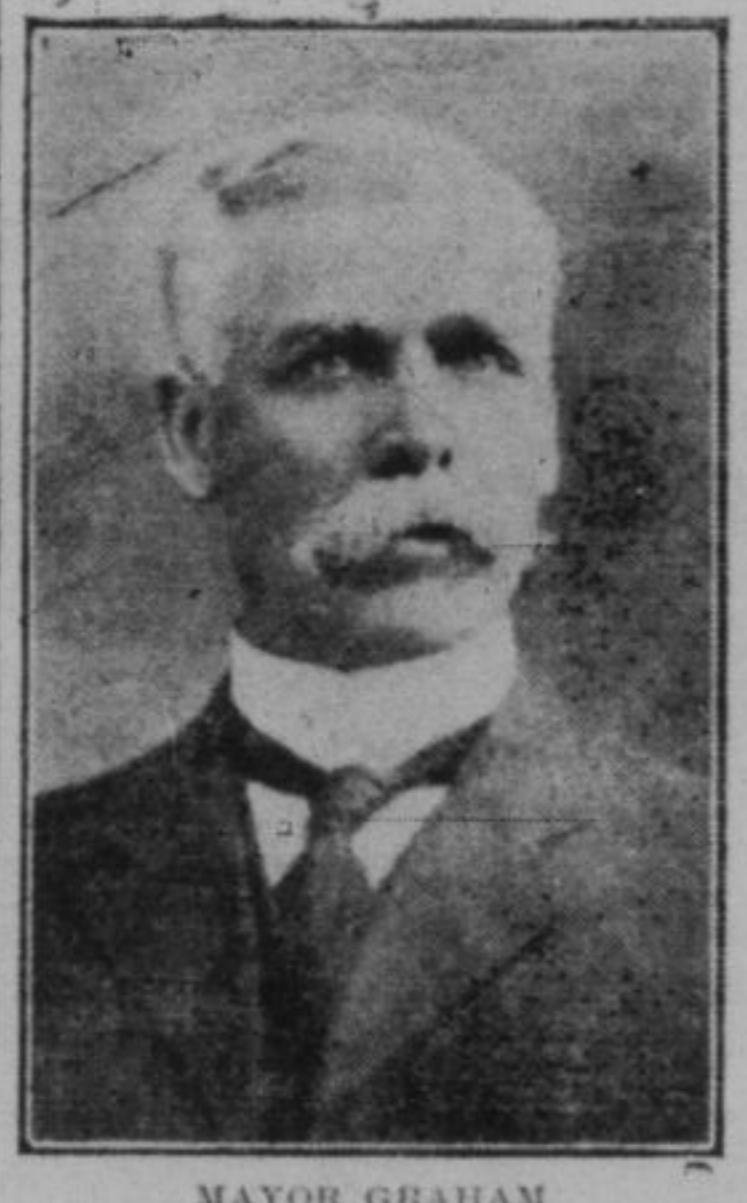

Kingston, and especially of those connected with Queen's would look with a great deal of interest at the progress of the new college of which he had been selected, to be the head.  
Dr. E. Ryan, vice-president of the board of trade, spoke on behalf of that body. He referred to the active part Prof. Dyde had taken, in work outside the university. A great many could be a professor, but nothing more. He was a man who came in contact with the students. He was about to leave for the west, which the speaker characterized as the one great

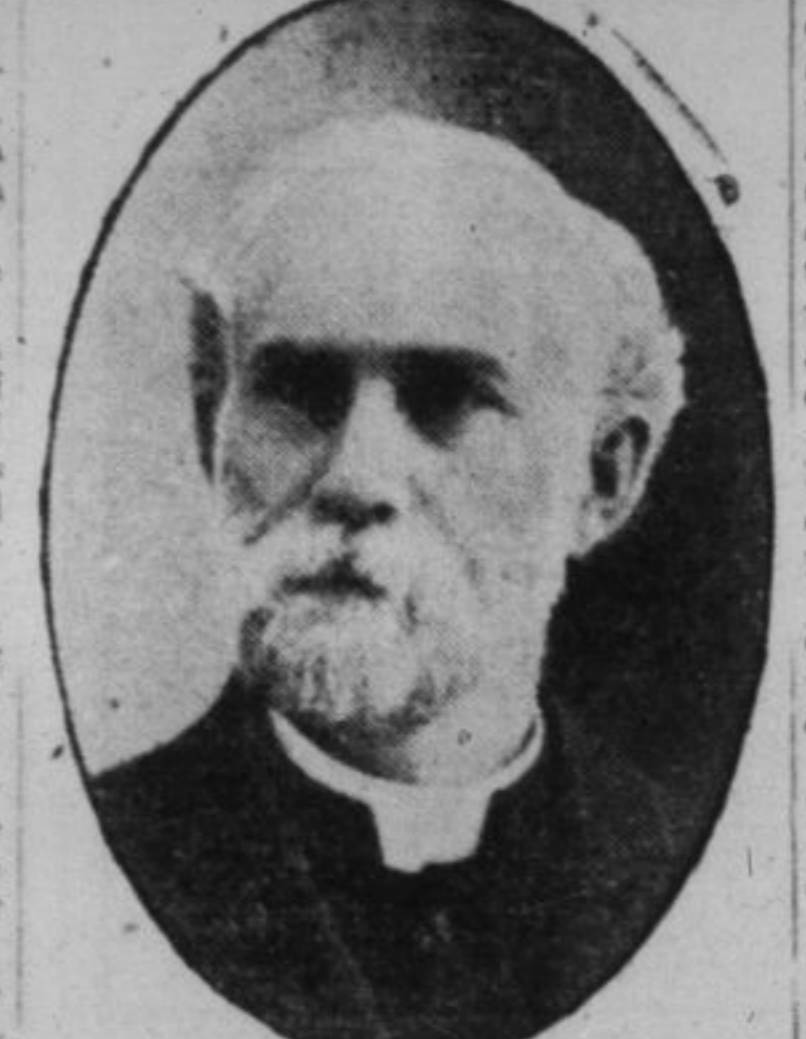

melting pot of all nations, and in Prof. Dyde, the city was sending out a worthy representative. He carried with him the best wishes of every citizen.  
W. J. Denton, chairman of the board of education, was the next speaker, and he stated that citizens realized that in the going away of Prof. Dyde, the city was losing one of her most loyal citizens. Queen's was losing one of her strongest pillars, and the province of Ontario one of her best educationists.  
The speaker referred to Prof. Dyde's work as a member of the Board of Education of the city. He had rendered able service as a trustee and had served as chairman of all the committees, and also as chairman of the board. The speaker expressed the hope that Prof. Dyde would be a power for good in the west.

Mr. Elliott read the following address:  
**The Citizens' Address.**  
The Rev. S. W. Dyde, D.Sc., LL.D., Principal-elect of the Presbyterian College of Alberta.  
As you are soon to leave Kingston, and the seat of learning, with whose growth and success you have been for some time so intimately connected, and to enter upon educational work in another province of our dominion, your fellow-citizens and colleagues have taken advantage of the occasion to convey to you their hearty congratulations on your appointment to a position of such high distinction, and also their deep sense of the valuable services you have rendered in various capacities as a citizen of Kingston. They are also not unmindful of the loss that will be sustained by our university and by many other leading interests through your forthcoming departure.  
An exceptionally brilliant career as a student of Queen's University was barely closed when you were called to the chair of philosophy in the University of New Brunswick. After several years of most acceptable service there, and when the chair of philosophy in Queen's was divided, you were the unanimous choice of the board of trustees for the new professorship thus created. The duties of that chair, in your Alma Mater, you have so performed as not only to win distinction for yourself as teacher and author, but also to influence for their highest intellectual and moral good a constantly growing body of students. This has been due not only to the uniform excellence of your work in the classroom, but even more to the stimulating help of upright example and sym-

mates, and who now held important positions. Touching on education, he said that it would never be perfect, but it was his opinion that the system could be made much more perfect than it is at the present time. He had reference to the education of the teachers and the model schools. It was his belief that the system of education would never be adequate as long as the university was isolated from the teacher. The teacher should begin at the university, and finish in the shadow of the university. The speaker believed there would be a union of the different churches. There were things looked upon ten years ago, with great doubt which could be carried out to-morrow. There was nothing to prevent it, in order to bring about this change, there were duties for each side to perform. At the present time we were nearing a union of three of the Protestant churches. This would not be looked upon as a barricade, but rather as an open door.  
The speaker expressed the hope that we might extend our sympathy to all that is human, to work in interests of our fellow man.  
Prof. Dyde made a feeling reference to all the old professors of Queen's, and expressed a wish in these words, "Professors may come, and professors may go, but Queen's will continue to do its work on the old Ontario strand."

And these various lines of action you have consistently sought to combine, so as to gain the one admirable end—the formation of the best and happiest type of Canadian manhood.  
In grateful recognition of these services, your friends have tendered you this complimentary dinner, and now further desire your acceptance for Mrs. Dyde and yourself of the accompanying gift in token of their regard.  
Mr. Laidlaw presented Prof. Dyde with a handsome cabinet of silver, as a parting gift from the citizens of Kingston. Mr. Laidlaw added a few appropriate remarks, conveying best wishes to Prof. Dyde and his family.  
**Prof. Dyde's Reply.**  
Prof. Dyde was given a grand ovation on rising to speak. He first referred to his student days, recalling many men who had been his class-

He referred to Prof. Dyde's early days, as a student, when he had taken honors in philosophy, and also referred to his work as a churchman. A warm tribute was also paid to Mrs. Dyde, who has always taken an active part in the work at Chalmers' church, since she became a member. Mrs. Dyde was devoted to missionary work, and her share in the work had been the means of doing much good. The speaker conveyed best wishes to the departing professor and his family.
