TO BE CHRISTENED

GOVERNMENT QUARANTINE VESSEL IS READY.

It Will be Launched into the Dry Dock—The Directors of the Kingston Shipbuilding Company Will be Here.

The christening of the government quarantine boat, which will be finished this week, will take place Tuesday, April 4th. The time has not been set yet, but it will likely be some time during the afternoon. The men have been working hard lately to get it completed and when finished it will present a fine appearance. The timbers are all placed now to launch her in the dock and men are busy now cutting ice outside the dock to make an open space. The Nevada has been in the dock all winter and the open space is being cut to run her out while the other boat will be launched into the dock. It will be an important event and the directors of the company who reside in outside cities will be here. It is not known yet who will christen the boat, but it will be a government official, on account of the fact that it is a government boat. This is the first boat of any size that has been christened here in years, and, no doubt, it will be quite an interesting event.

BORN WITH SMALLPOX.

Body of Babe Sent to McGill University.

Montreal, March 31.—The body of a newborn infant was received at McGill University by express from Sydney, N.S. A note, pinned to the box in which the body was sent, stated that the infant was born with smallpox, fully developed, its mother having had the disease previously. "I believe that McGill is now the only university in Canada to have such a specimen," said the head of the medical faculty. The body was placed in the university museum.

CUSTOMS REVENUE

IS \$13,000,000 MORE THAN LAST YEAR.

Gunner Allen to Have a New Trial For Killing Capt. Allison—Flags to Fly on All Public Buildings.

Ottawa, March 31.—The customs revenue of the dominion for the fiscal year ending to-day, will exceed that of last year by over thirteen million dollars, and is the largest in the history of the country. The returns received up to noon, to-day, show that the revenue for the year 1910-11 has been seventy-two million dollars.

The supreme court, to-day, quashed the conviction and ordered a new trial for Gunner Allen, sentenced to death for killing his officer, Capt. Allison, Esquimaux, on the ground that certain evidence admitted was really inadmissible.

Hon. William Pugsley, minister of public works, has ordered that not only on public buildings on the frontier, but on every public building in interior cities and towns, shall the Union Jack be displayed every day from sunrise to sunset.

SANG IN COMMONS

SHEFFIELD CHOIR CHEERED BY MEMBERS.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Proposed the Cheers—"O Canada" Was Magnificently Rendered.

Ottawa, March 31.—A remarkable scene was witnessed in the House of Commons, last evening, when, at the six o'clock adjournment for dinner, the famous Sheffield choir took possession of one of the galleries and rendered a short programme. Roars of enthusiasm greeted them, and at the conclusion of their brief entertainment, Sir Wilfrid Laurier led the storm of cheering.

Shortly after six, Speaker Marois mounted the dias, and, after welcoming the choir to parliament, thanked them for coming to greet the chamber and to give the legislators an opportunity of hearing them. Then Col. Smith, the sergeant-at-arms, rose and bowed to Dr. Coward, who, with his choir, was seated in the main gallery right over the press gallery. In an instant there pealed forth the strains of "O Canada," magnificently rendered, and the whole house rose and stood during its rendition. The choir repeated the final verse as an encore, and then sang an anthem, which, in its soft melody, was in direct contrast to the stirring harmonies of Canada's one and only national hymn. As a final effort the choir sang "God Save the King," as it has never been heard before inside the parliament buildings, and when it was over the premier cried "Three cheers for the Sheffield choir!" which was given enthusiastically.

REAL CHURCH UNION.

Saskatoon, March 31.—A practical scheme of church union was decided upon by the Methodists and Presbyterians of Saskatoon at a mass meeting of members of six city churches. All of the churches are face to face with the building question, and it was decided to erect three large churches instead of six smaller ones.

DEBATE IN REICHSTAG.

Hot-air Talk of Annexation of Canada.

Berlin, March 31.—The reichstag was crowded, yesterday afternoon, in anticipation of an interesting debate on foreign affairs, in which the relations of Germany with the various powers was to be taken up. The debate was started by Dr. Spahn, leader of the Catholic centre party. He was followed by Count Kanitz, leader of the Agrarians and leader of the home-conservatives, who devoted much of his address to the United States. Count Kanitz said the desire of America to cultivate closer relations with Canada was shown by her entering into an unprecedentedly comprehensive reciprocity treaty with that country. America, he said, expected eventually to detach Canada from the British empire, and set her northern neighbor up as a republic.

This impression, continued Count Kanitz, was strengthened by the enthusiasm with which Champ Clark's speech for annexation was welcomed in the American House of Representatives. England ought to realize after these incidents, said the speaker, that Germany was not her worst enemy. Referring to President Taft's arbitration proposal to Great Britain, Count Kanitz said that so long as the United States excluded questions affecting the Monroe doctrine from arbitration treaties, the latter would be futile, as most easily lead to diplomatic differences.

ROMAN CATHOLIC CHOSEN

For the Position Held by Late Justice Girouard.

Ottawa, March 31.—It is stated, to-day, that Hon. L. P. Brodeur will not be appointed to the supreme court bench until towards the end of next summer.

It is reported that Sir Alan Ayleworth was anxious that Eugene Lafleur, K.C., of Montreal, should get the appointment, but this distinguished lawyer was barred because he is a Huguenot. The government desired that a Roman Catholic should succeed the late Judge Girouard, who was a Roman Catholic.

Church Union Vote.

Toronto, March 31.—The Presbyterian announcement that of sixty-four presbyteries throughout the country, fifty-three voted for church union on the proposed basis, while fourteen were opposed. Nine hundred and sixteen votes were cast in favor of it and 400 adverse.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECORDED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Twenty metres of the crater of Vesuvius on the north side collapsed suddenly on Thursday.

A British company to manufacture military aeroplanes, will shortly be formed. It will have a capital of one million dollars.

Richard Mathias, the ship-owner, of Cardiff, who was elected to the House of Commons from Cheltenham, Eng., has been unseated by the courts upon the strength of a petition alleging illegal practices.

The rumor of a Chinese attack upon Blagovieshtensk, the capital of the Amur province, arose from the expulsion from the Russian back of the Amur river of many Chinese who had fled thither from plague centers.

The death of Sarah Kupla, a sixteen-year-old girl, who jumped from the eighth floor of the Aech building, New York, during Saturday's fire horror, brought the list of victims up to a total of 144. The girl's back was broken.

POWER FOR KINGSTON.

Hon. Adam Beck to Come East Next Week.

Toronto, March 31.—Accompanying the statement that the government has approved of the Windsor extension is the news that an arrangement has been arrived at between the hydro-electric commission and the New York Ontario Power company to supply power sufficient for the eastern group of municipalities. The commission has received an optional contract with the company for fifteen thousand horse power. This will supply power for Napanee, Kingston, Lansdowne, Brockville, Lyn, Prescott, Cardinal, Morrisburg and Athens, the members of the eastern Municipalities Power Union.

Hon. Adam Beck was not prepared, yesterday, to give the prices at which power could be supplied to the municipalities, but he stated that the power in Eastern Ontario would be at a favorable price as the towns and cities in Western Ontario which are being supplied by Niagara power.

The whole matter, including prices, will be laid before the municipalities at a meeting to be held next week either Brockville or Kingston. The chairman of the commission will attend the meeting with the hydro-electric engineers and go into the details of the contract.

STRIKE IN ALBERTA

Between Three and Four Thousand Coal Miners.

Lethbridge, Alta., March 31.—Indications are that between three and four thousand miners throughout the coal mines of Alberta will go on strike to-night, as a result of an agitation which has been going on some time. In some places they are already out. The question largely involved is the recognition of the union. The situation is looked on as quite serious for one of the province's chief industries.

CALL TO YANKEE PASTOR

To Spurgeon's Old Church in London.

Chicago, March 31.—It is something new for a United States preacher to be called to an old country pulpit, and Rev. Dr. Dixon, pastor of Moody's church here, has that distinction, being called to Spurgeon's old church in London. He has told them in London he will not consider the call while they have a pew renting system.

Kissed Dead Wife's Lips.

Schenectady, N.Y., March 31.—Albert Adams, aged forty-four years, an expert varnish maker, died Wednesday night of pneumonia, after three days' illness, following the kissing of the lips of his dead wife, who died last week of the same disease.

Verdict for Dew.

London, March 31.—Former Inspector Dew, of Scotland Yard, was, to-day, awarded a verdict of \$2,000 damages against the London Chronicle for that paper publishing a report that he had told its correspondent Dr. Crippen had confessed.
