



George Carruthers, night clerk at the British-American Hotel, fell down the stairway there at three o'clock Saturday morning, and lies now in the Hotel Dieu in a serious condition with small chance of recovery. Shortly after the accident happened. Dr. Robert Hanley was called, and later Corbett's ambulance removed the unconscious man to the Hotel Dieu.
