Fritzi Scheff began an indefinite engagement at the Shubert theatre in Boston this week, in her new comic opera, "Mlle. Rosita."

At the Lyceum theatre, London, a revival of "The Prisoner of Zenda" was made by Henry Ainley and Miss Rosalie Toller in the principal parts.

Elaie Janis celebrated her twenty-first birthday on March 15th, at the Globe theatre, New York, with a tea for the "Slim Princess" company.

H. B. Sheldon, author of "The Hove," has written a new play called "The Fool's Creed," which will be produced in New York in September.

William Collier is planning to appear in a repertoire of his former successes. This he may do at the end of his season in "I'll Be Hanged If I Do."

Somerset Maugham's latest effort, "Lovers and Fishes," was staged at the Duke of York's theatre, London, Robert Lordaine and Miss Ellis Jeffrye, enacting the leading characters.

Johanna Redmond, daughter of the Irish Nationalist leader, has written a play and had it produced in London. It is called "Falsely True," and deals with Irish life in the time of Robert Emmett.

Robert Warwick, the leading man in "The Balkan Princess," was still his present engagement, a dramatic actor. Now in "The Balkan Princess" he is required to both dance and sing.

TIPS ON SMUGGLERS.

Women Like to Evade Tariff, But Can't Keep Mouth Shut.

You hear a lot of discussion about the way the customs officials get tips about the dresses and the jewelry American women purchase in Paris, said an American who is in business in the French capital. "It is perfectly simple."

You can sit on the curbstone of the Avenue de l'Opera any day in the season and listen to the chat of the American women who go by. Nine out of ten of them will be talking about what they have been buying. You can sit in the reception room of a Paris hotel, with a paper in front of you pretending to read, and you can hear bunches of women talking nothing but clothes. "I'm going to get so and so, one will say, and another will tell how 'Charlie' is going to let her have this. Another will say that her husband has promised to get her a diamond pendant if she can get along with fewer dresses than she has planned. For the equivalent of 10c the talker will get you the names of these women."

You can walk into a shop and appear to be looking at a \$5 match-box while a party of Americans are examining a magnificent "diamond necklace and can overhear the conversation. In almost every case in which information about articles purchased abroad reaches the ears of the customs officials the women who make the purchases are in some way responsible for the information leaking out.

"There are a lot of persons in Paris who make their living just by keeping their ears open. They carry what they have heard to the United States treasury agents in Paris, and when a seizure is made upon their information they receive a slice of what the government gets out of it."

"I know a woman, an American, who lives in Paris, who makes a handsome income just out of keeping her ears open. She used to be hard up, but now she dresses as well as almost everybody else, and I happen to know that she is an informer. These persons who make as much as \$10,000 a year in this way."

"It is easy enough. Why, two smart Americans by spending their time hanging about the Avenue de l'Opera and the Rue de la Paix, keeping their ears open and occasionally peeping into the shop windows, could make all the money they want. It is a mistaken impression that some persons have that Paris merchants make it their business to inform the United States authorities of each purchase made by an American in their shops. The whole trouble is that women want to smuggle, but they do not like to keep their mouths shut."
