SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.00.

IMMIGRATION WILL BE VERY HEAVY THIS YEAR.

Quite a Number Have Already Located in the Kingston District—Far West is Attracting the Majority—Vessels Coming Out Are Crowded.

A number of emigrants from the mother country have located in the Kingston district within the past few months and the report they make is that the number to come out this country this year will be far in excess of last year.

According to the story told by some of the strangers they come out here with the idea that the country has great need for men and if they do not get a job the very minute they land here, as it were, they are sadly disappointed.

Apples and Honey. Woodstock Sentinel-Review.

Mr. Lewis, M.P. for a western Ontario constituency, has introduced a bill to penalize shippers who put small apples in the centre of the barrel and large ones at the top and bottom. Thanks to the bulkiness of Mr. Lewis' friends the bill is not likely to get far this session.

The most it will accomplish at present, and probably at any time, is to formally acknowledge that some Ontario shippers do resort to this practice. The acknowledgment is not necessary in this part of the world, where shulduggery of this and similar kinds has pretty well ruined the Ontario apple trade, but it may have some effect on the culprits to see their crimes thus publicly exposed in parliament and know that the rope is being twisted for them. A more certain and easily enforced remedy would be to prevent anybody selling apples by the barrel. British Columbia apples are sold in crates with crevices between the slats. The man who buys a crate knows what he is getting, because he sees it. The packer, of course, knowing this, governs himself accordingly. The man who buys a barrel of apples has no real knowledge of whether he is getting Tahmah Sweets or Tom Brown's seedlings. And the packer knowing this, also governs himself accordingly.
