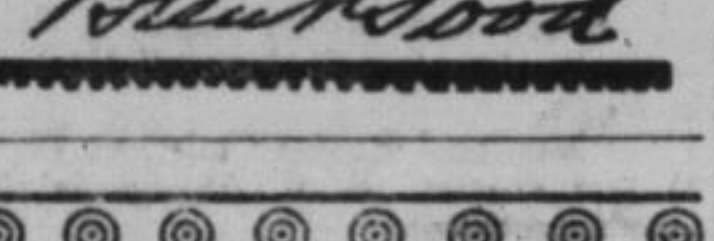

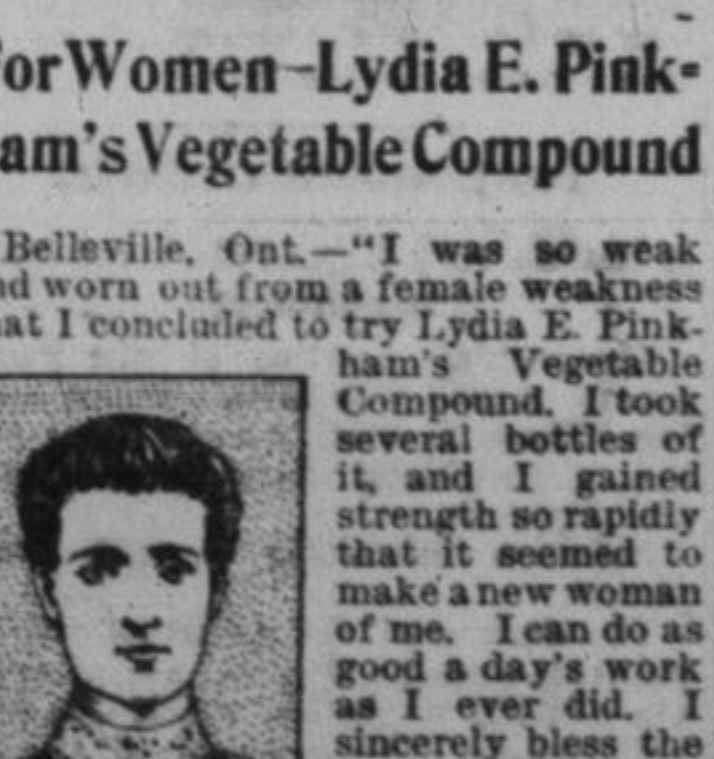

PNEUMONIC PLAGUE
HELP FOR OLD
BACKS THAT ACHE

Doctors Attending Inter-
national Conference.
Disease Always Fatal—Success of
Physicians of Modern School Has
Greatly Impressed the Chinese.
Pekin, April 4.—The Chinese physi-
cians have made the most elaborate
preparations for the international medi-
cal conference, which will begin at
Mukden to-morrow, for the purpose of
investigating the plague situation.
Doctors of many nations are at-
tending. Dr. R. P. Strong, of the
Bureau of Science in the Philippine Is-
lands, will take a prominent part in
the conference, as he has been in Muk-
den for some time past making a
bacteriological study of the disease
and endeavoring to discover an effec-
tive toxin. The Indian and other
preparations have proved unavail-
ing, and only masks have been found
effective in preventing infection.
Many marmots, from which the dis-
ease was first contracted by the hunters
who secured the pelts, have been
collected for experiment at the con-
ference. Although no cure has been
found for the plague, the doctors
feel confident from the knowledge they
have already gleaned by observation
and experimentation that they will
eventually find a certain means in the
form of a serum to combat the dis-
ease.

At the outbreak of the present epi-
demic practically no knowledge con-
cerning its treatment existed, and the
first methods employed, which were on
the lines generally adopted against
bubonic, proved fatal to several of the
doctors. This intimidated others, but
there were a few brave men who went
among the stricken people and demon-
strated that the disease could be con-
trolled.

Dr. S. Kitano, the noted Japanese
bacteriologist, says that while no vic-
tim of pneumonic plague recovers, this
disease is really more easily controlled
than bubonic, as the pneumonic is
contracted only from exhalations or
expectorations, which can easily be
avoided. The bacilli die quickly in
dry air, therefore, the fear of the dust
storms, which have been prevalent this
season, is groundless.

Dr. Kitano says the pneumonic
plague to consumption. Although it is
a thousand times quicker in its ac-
tion, it takes exactly the same chan-
nels of transmission. He hopes the
bacilli will be exterminated when the
warm weather drives the Chinese out-
doors, where they can escape the dan-
ger of infection from breathing the
polluted atmosphere. The railway
zones in cities are now nearly entire-
ly free from the plague, but the in-
terior towns and villages are still suf-
fering seriously.

The success of the doctors of the
modern school is giving rise to the
beginning of a new medical era in
China. The old school advocates op-
posed the modern methods at first, in-
sisting that the old style medicine men
should be given a chance. The ineffec-
tiveness of their so-called cures and
the great mortality among them finally
convinced the more intelligent Chi-
nese officials that the western methods
were superior but without the fear on
the part of China of interference from
Russia and Japan the modern physi-
cians would probably never have re-
ceived the opportunity of proving the
value of western ideas.

Reports from the famine district say
that many missionaries are engaged in
special efforts to save the children
from starvation. They have establish-
ed orphanages and have been gather-
ing together deserted children and
those who have lost their parents. The
distributing centres are unable to
supply sufficient rice for the purpose
of food, but are giving out much
bean cake, which is generally used as
a fertilizer, and to feed the cattle. The
famine fever is raging and it is stated
that the famine is worse than in 1906.

Excited and probably panic-stricken
they would surely be, for we all
know how the mere mention of fire
will drive even a crowd of grown men
and women crazy with fright. Possi-
bly fire drill cannot take place in
winter, but now, now, is the time,
and it should be undertaken systemat-
ically, regularly. Do not wait until,
through cruel negligence, even one
of our beloved ones is taken from us
by so awful a death. There are two
doors to nearly every class room, but
they are always locked, and would
certainly be of no use in a time of
fire or accident.—REASONABLY ANX-
IOUS.
