DEATH AT DINNER PARTY.

Town Councillor Murdered by His Wife and Relatives.

Vienna, April 6.—A town councillor named Constantachy, of Jussy, Roumania, has been murdered by his wife, her father and her brothers, who have been arrested and have confessed.

Two days ago, they say, Constantachy was invited to dinner by his father-in-law, a schoolmaster. During the meal Constantachy's wife, piled him with liquor till he was completely drunk. When he was lying helpless on the ground she soaked him with petroleum and set fire to him. The man revived only to be burned to death. The remains were cut up and part was thrown in the River Danube. The rest was buried in the garden, and this being unscrupled by dogs, led to the revelation of the crime.

AWARDED \$2,500 DAMAGES.

Roch Fell Down Mine Where Working.

North Bay, Ont., April 6.—In the high court, before Chief Justice Falconbridge, the jury awarded damages against the Temiskaming Mining company to Calixte Sevion of \$2,500. Sevion was injured in the mine by a rock falling down the mine where he was working, and claimed that the company was negligent in not providing safeguards.

John C. Appleyard was found guilty of rape on the person of Mrs. Jennie Hill, of Brethour township, November 11th last. The jury added a strong recommendation to mercy. Sentence was deferred.

ALAS! POOR LO.

Killed by White Girl Indian Took Acid.

Chicago, April 6.—Frank Little Buffalo, a Sioux Indian, committed suicide in Gary, Ind., yesterday, by drinking carbolic acid.

Buffalo, it is said, fell in love with a white girl in Gary, and because she did not return his love, took the poison. He had been employed as night janitor of the city hall of the Indiana town since last summer, when he arrived in Gary with a vivid west show, was recognized by Mayor "Tom" Knotts as an old friend and was offered a place on the municipal payroll.

Duma Elects New President.

St. Petersburg, April 6.—M. Rodzianko was elected, president of the duma.

The Rech, in an editorial, interprets the election of M. Rodzianko as the forerunner of reconciliation between the Octobrists and M. Stolypin, and a general quieting down of political controversies.

In a speech after his election, M. Rodzianko expressed faith in the vitality of representative institutions, his faith being strengthened, he said, by the unanimity displayed by all parties during the recent days of apprehension.

Accidentally Poisoned.

St. Thomas, Ont., April 6.—A death from accidental poisoning occurred at Griffin's Corners, Bayham, near here. Mrs. Hill, a middle-aged lady, had been ill for some days, and as there was no doctor near, kindly-intentioned neighbors volunteered aid. One of them secured a bottle of medicine from another neighbor, and with the intention of helping the sick woman, the decoction was administered and shortly after the woman died. The medicine was balsam copaliba. A coroner called later on and decided an inquest was unnecessary.

Changes in Regulations.

A number of changes in the regulations of the department of education are issued. They relate to the primary and secondary schools.

The announcement includes notice of the establishment of a senior entrance examination, to begin in June, 1912, in the middle school of the high and continuation schools, based on the study of the lower school and the high schools.

The September examinations of pupils from non-approved schools will this year and 1912 and 1913 be held in the local centres instead of at the normal schools.

Corruption to be Probed.

Harrisburg, Pa., April 6.—The resolutions, one to investigate charges of corruption in Pittsburgh, and the other to inquire into municipal conditions in both Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, are before the legislature, as the result of an attack made, here, last week, against Mayor William A. Magee, of Pittsburgh, personally, and his administration in general, by A. Leo Weil, president of the Voters' League of Allegheny county. Both resolutions were referred to committees.
